EFFECT OF ROBERTS BANK ON  
MIGRATORY BIRDS

Question No. 1,430—**Mr. Anderson:**

1. Has the Canadian Wildlife Service commissioned studies to determine the effect of the Roberts Bank development on migratory birds using the Pacific flyway?

2. Is the Canadian Wildlife Service represented at the planning and development levels of this project?

3. Will federal legislation on pollution and contamination control in the Roberts Bank area be placed before the House this year?

**Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development):** 1. No studies outside the Canadian Wildlife Service have been commissioned or contracted. However, the Service itself has carried out studies at the Roberts Bank area and plans to do so in future in order to evaluate the effects of the superport development there on waterfowl habitat.

2. The Service was consulted unofficially early in the planning stage but is not represented on any planning and development board.

3. No new legislation on pollution and contamination will be placed before the House under the auspices of the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

CANADIAN PBX STORES

Question No. 1,440—**Mr. MacLean:**

1. Is it the policy of the Government of Canada to allow personnel of other NATO forces stationed in Germany to shop in Canadian PBX stores and, if so, does this amount to the subsidization by Canada of purchases by the Armed Forces of other countries?

2. To which countries are these privileges extended?

3. Have there been complaints, either official or unofficial, by Canadian Forces Personnel that personnel of other countries are allowed to shop in Canadian stores?

**Mr. D. W. Groos (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of National Defence):** 1. Yes, except for the host country, NATO forces personnel are permitted to use non-public fund

retail outlets at Canadian units in Germany. Except for space provided by the Canadian Forces, stock, shipping, salaries, etc., are paid for from non-public funds.

2. This is a reciprocal arrangement and extends to all NATO forces personnel except those of the host country.

3. Some minor complaints are received from time to time from personnel who do not appear to realize that reciprocal agreements exist with other NATO countries.

PSYCHIATRIST IN YUKON AND NORTHWEST  
TERRITORIES SCHOOLS

Question No. 1,446—**Mr. Orlikow:**

1. Is there a full-time or part-time Psychiatrist working with school children in the Yukon and Northwest Territories?

2. How much time does he spend each year on this task?

3. How many schools has he visited in each of the past three years and how much time did he spend in each school?

4. How are the children examined by the Psychiatrist chosen?

5. When teachers refer children to the Psychiatrist do they submit written reports to the Psychiatrist before he sees the children?

6. After the examination, does the Psychiatrist report or make recommendations regarding each child to the principal or the teacher?

**Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare):** 1. No, but teams of consultants visit periodically.

4. Children may be selected for psychiatric examination by parents, teachers, welfare workers, public health nurses or physicians. Visiting consultant psychiatrists from Toronto in the Eastern Arctic, from Winnipeg in the Central Arctic and from Edmonton in the western districts carry out examinations and if evacuation is necessary examinations take place in major referral centres in the south.

5. There is no mandatory procedure. Public Health Nurses or local physicians are usually involved in the referral. The psychiatrist may review such information from teachers and medical reports as is pertinent, and may elicit further information by directing questions toward knowledgeable persons and to the patient.
