ANDREW DES LAURIERS

He was put on life support at Toronto General Hospital but despite the hopes and prayers of family and colleagues, Andrew died last night.

My son-in-law, Mark Zaorski, has been a fire-fighter in North York for eight years. He was one of the dozens of fire-fighters trying to contain this tragic blaze.

Fire-fighters are always ready to protect our lives and property, putting their own lives at risk time and time again. Canadians owe these men and women much gratitude and respect.

WESTERN GRAIN STABILIZATION PROGRAM

Mr. Vic Althouse (Mackenzie): Mr. Speaker, farmers are being sent a bill for a \$41 million mistake made by the federal government.

The government paid out interim cheques under the Western Grain Stabilization Program about a year ago, based on a guess on how much the farmers' crops would be worth for the last three years. It was not until last August when the program ended that it took a second look and found its mistake.

With the Saskatchewan election pending no decision was made. But now, farmers who had no say in how much they received from the program in the first place are being billed and not being told why. Even farmers who had left the land in 1989 are receiving bills of up to \$750.

The grains and oilseeds minister acknowledges this is a difficult time to be asking farmers for cash. He claims, however, the government has to collect and has given farmers until July 15 in which to respond.

Last year's deficit was \$2 billion more than estimated. Does this mean other Canadians will be receiving bills demanding repayment for the government's overspending too?
