# Measures and Weights 

IN ORDINARY USE AMONG HOLSEKEEPERS.

Four teaspoonsful equal one tablespoonful liquid.
Four tablespoonsful equal one wise glass, or half a gill.
Two wineglasses equat one gitt, or half a cup.
Two gilis equal one coffee-cul ful, or sisteen tablespoonsful.
Two coffee-cup-ful equal one pint.
Two pints equal one quart.
Four quarts equal one gallon.
Two tablespconsful equal one ounce, liquid.
One tablespoonful of salt equals one ounce.
sixteen ounces equal one pound, or a pint of liquid
Four coffee-cuy fuls of siffed flour equat one pound.
One quart of unsifted flour equals one pound.
Eight or ten ordinary sized eggs equal one pound.
One fint of sugar equals one pound. (White granulated.)
Two coffec-cup fut of powdered sugar equat one pound.
One coffec-cupful of cold butter, pressed down, is one half-pound.
One tablespoonful of soft butter, well rounded, equals one ounce.
An ordinary tumblerful equals one coffee-cupful, or half a pint.
About twenty-five drops of any thin liquid will fill a common-sized teaspoon.

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
