

## ROADS CARRIED MUCH LESS GRAIN

### Big Falling Off Shown in the Movement of Western Crop.

Statistics of the distribution of the grain crop of the west as carried by the railroads show a decided decrease last year from 1913. Dating from September 1 to February 7 inclusive, the comparisons show that the Canadian Northern in 1914 carried 35,296 cars of all kinds of grain as against 46,532 in 1913 for the months mentioned. This was for 1914 30 per cent of the total amount hauled, but shows a decrease of 16,953 cars.

The C.P.R. carried 56 per cent in 1913 of all the grain hauled, against 52 per cent last year. The G.T.P. carried 10,825 last year against 17,073 in 1913, a decrease of 6,253 cars, or 11 per cent of the total amount hauled, but shows a decrease of 16,953 cars.

The total decrease in cars of grain hauled in 1914 when compared with 1913 is 32,434 cars. It will be noted from the above figures that the four railways handling the crop, the C.N.R. has an increase in movement of 2 per cent, the G.T.P. an increase of over 11-1/2 per cent, while the G.N.R. has a fractional decrease of four-tenths of one per cent. The figures also show a total decrease on the 1913 crop hauled of 44 per cent. The figures apply to all kinds of grain hauled by the four roads.

### WINNIPEG ELECTRIC MEETING ADJOURNED

The annual meeting of the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company was held for Wednesday, but owing to the fact that there was no quorum, it was adjourned until February 19th. No information was given as to the results of the past year's business, all reports and statements being withheld until the adjourned meeting.

There is a good deal of interest locally as to what the company will show. The decline in earnings and speculation last autumn as to the permanency of the dividend, but the January last payment was declared as usual, and it is hoped that the statement will show dividends earned by at least a small margin.

### BREADSTUFFS AFLOAT.

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—According to compilation by R. Frank Howard of The Daily Bread Bulletin, and which will be printed this afternoon, supplies of breadstuffs afloat for Europe and in store in Europe, America, Argentina and Australia totaled 219,723,000 bushels Feb. 1st, compared with 215,000 bushels January 1st, and 261,651,000 bushels February 1st, a year ago. The decrease during January was equal to 3,749,000 bushels, compared with an increase of 9,295,000 bushels in January of last year. The decrease in the United States during the past month was reported at 17,736,000 bushels, and the decrease in Canada, 3,777,000 bushels.

### NEW C.N.R. ISSUE.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Canadian Northern have privately placed an additional half-million sterling of guaranteed stock.

When the attention of Canadian Northern officials was called to the above and asked how the money would be used, the reply was made that they did not care to discuss the matter at the present time.

### AFTER RUSSIAN BUSINESS.

Mr. Amelius Jarvis, president, and Mr. A. W. Westley, general manager of the Canadian Northern, who have arrived in Russia in connection with negotiations for government business which have been under way for some time.

### RUSSIANS STRENGTHEN PRUSSIAN BORDER LINES

Thousands of Laborers Employed in Improving Second Points of Defence.

Berlin, Feb. 12.—(Via London)—The National Zeitung has published a despatch from a correspondent on the Russian border, who says the Russians are employing thousands of laborers to strengthen their second line of defence.

At the fortress of Ivanograd, Bratslav, Litovsk and Kovno men are working day and night. At Bratslav arrangements have been made to flood the entire district, and for a distance of 75 miles the territory around the fortress has been barred to ordinary travel. Great stores of ammunition and provisions are being laid in.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The role head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in "Prairie, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
