RADIAL BYLAW TO BE SUBMITTED

Board of Control Reached Decision After Conference With Sir Adam Beck.

GUARANTEE BONDS

Ratepayers Will Be Asked to Vote Three Million Dollars as City's Part.

Following a conference with Sir Adam Beck in regard to the Hydro-Electric radial and the proposed system of rapid transit for Toronto, the board of control yesterday decided to submit to the people at the forthcoming election a bylaw authorizing the city to guarantee debentures to the extent of \$3,000,000 as the city's part of the general Hydro-Electric radial scheme for the Province of Ontario.

This grant has nothing to do with the city's local transportation problem, the radial entrances or terminals within the city, all of which will be taken care of by the city itself.

Mayor Church announced yesterday that he would call a special meeting of council for Wednesday, when the whole scheme will be laid before the aldermen with a view to preparing the necessary bylaw.

THE REAL RIDEAU ROUTE.

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TURK DIGGERS FLED BEFORE FRENCHMEN

Revolvers and Hand Grenades Threw Fear Into Enemy.

PARIS, Dec. 1.—Today's French official report, dealing with Dardanelles operations, says: "The days of Nov. 27 and 28 were characterized by the activity with which mining operations were conducted by ourselves and our enemies. An explosion brought about by French troops caused the demolition of a Turkish listening post. The men in one of our galleries, having cut their way to a Turkish gallery, French sappers went forward, and with revolvers and hand grenades, compelled the Turkish diggers to flee."

KING LUDWIG YEARS FOR HONORABLE PEACE

Refers to "Severe Trials" in Message to Imperial Chancellor.

BERLIN, Dec. 1, via Staville.—In addition to the telegram from Emperor William, Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg received birthday congratulations from King Ludwig of Bavaria, King Frederick August of Saxony, Field-Marshal von Hindenburg, and many others. The chancellor was 69 years of age on Monday.

Emperor William sent a valuable message of greeting follows: "The German nation has achieved great deeds in these times of severe trials. Our confidence and will are unshakable to continue the struggle to a victorious end and an honorable peace, worthy of our great sacrifice."

ACCUSES PRISON BARBER OF SUPPLYING LIQUOR

Joseph Murphy Gives Drink as Excuse for Attempting to Escape from Prison.

While working in a brickyard at the Mimico Prison Farm, James Mulhall, who was serving an 18-month term, made a break for liberty. Yesterday he appeared before Judge Winchester of the county criminal court and was sentenced to two years in Kingston. This sentence will run concurrently with the previous one.

Joseph Murphy, who also escaped with Mulhall, will be sentenced next Wednesday. In the witness box Murphy swore that there is trafficking in liquor all the time among the prisoners at the Central Prison brickyard, Mimico. He was a trusted prisoner and his duty was to go for the milk in the morning. On the morning of Nov. 19 he said he was given a couple of drinks of whiskey by Arthur Nunn, the prison barber. The drinks were too much for him and put him out of his wits. Judge Winchester ordered that a copy of Murphy's statement be sent to Warden Gilmour of the Ontario Reformatory.
