" that it may be placed on the Marquis de Montcalm's " tomb.

"Should such leave be granted, may I presume, "sir, that you will be so good as to inform me of it, and, at the same time, to send me a passport; that the marble, with the epitaph engraved on it, may be received into an English ship; and that Mr. Murray, Governor of Quebec, may allow it to be placed in the Ursuline church.

"You will be pleased, sir, to pardon me for this intrusion on your important occupations; but endeavouring to immortalize illustrious men and eminent patriots is doing honour to yourself.

" It is a real satisfaction to me to send you the "King's consent on a subject so affecting as the "epitaph, composed by the Academy of Inscriptions "at Paris, for the Marquis de Montcalm; and which "it is desired may be sent to Quebec, engraved on "marble, to be placed on the tomb of that illustrious "Soldier. It is perfectly beautiful; and the desire "of the French troops which served in Canada to "pay such a tribute to the memory of thelr General, "they saw expire at their head in a manner worthy "of himself and of them, is truly noble and praise-"worthy.

" I shall take a pleasure, sir, in facilating, in every "way, such amiable intentions: and on receiving "notice of the measures taken for shipping this "marble, will not fail to transmit to you immediately "the passport you desire, and to send directions to "the governor of Quebec for its reception.
