
FAMOUS RACING MAN DEAD.

FAMOUS RACING MAN DEAD.

London, Dec. 22.—A well-known figure in the racing world is removed by the death of H. M. Dorling, the veteran clerk of the course at Epsom and Brighton. Mr. Dorling, who was born in 1836, had been clerk of the Epsom raceoourse since 1872, and, in spite of his advanced age, he continued active in his duties until his recent illness. He succeeded his father, Henry Dorling, who was lessee of the Epsom grandstand. H. M. Dorling, who was at one time handicapper to Epsom and Brighton, was a grandson of William Dorling, who established the first printing business in Epsom in 1821, and who shortly afterwards commenced the publication of Dorling's Race Card, which has been printed ever since by the Dorling family. H. M. Dorling was managing director of the Epsom Grandstand Association and first chairman of the Epsom Urban Council.
