RACING CONDITIONS REMAIN UNCHANGED

**No Ice Meetings Expected
But Four Tracks Will Be
Busy With the Runners.**

Mr. Fraser, the O.J.C. secretary, and secretary of the Canadian Racing Associations, gives the result of the report of the order-in-council in a nutshell.

"There is no change whatever from the conditions existing prior to passing the order-in-council in 1917, and consequently there is no comment to make." As the regulations now stand "the partnership system and the bookmaker will be quite legal after Jan. 1.

While the Miller bill would allow trotting meetings besides the 14 days legal sessions, for the 2 runners, there are not likely to be any who meets this winter at other places.

The practice before the order-in-council was four meetings per track per annum of three days each with two days extra for unfinished events.

It goes without saying that Hillcrest and Dufferin Parks will hold their half-mile running organ as before the edict.

Thus Toronto is entitled the coming summer to 56 days of lawful running races on four tracks as follows:

These plots cannot see an atom of sense in the proposed plan to ban the "white sticks," and they will, no doubt, be lined up against it when it is formally presented, if it ever reaches that stage.

Nobody seems to know—at least, nobody will take credit—who started the drive against the cigaret, so Branch Rickey of the St. Louis Cards is blamed generously, because the Cardinal boss

Fred Mitchell of the Cubs recently expressed himself clearly on the matter. "I would prefer that my men refrain from the use of cigarettes," he said, "but there is no use to set up a hard-and-fast rule again if, because it will be just one more rule for the players to break." Mitchell says he cannot be with his men

"When I find that smoking is interfering with a man's work, I tell him about it, and if he refuses to give up smoking he can give up his job," is the way McGraw sums it up.

FAMOUS RACING MAN DEAD.

London, Dec. 22.—A well-known figure in the racing world is removed by the

Mr. Dorling, who was born in 1836, had been clerk of the Epsom racecourse since 1872, and, in spite of his advanced age, he continued active in his duties until his recent illness. He succeeded his father, Henry Dorling, who was lessee of the Epsom grandstand. H. M. Dorling, who was at one time handicapper to Epsom and Brighton, was a grandson of William Dorling, who established the first printing business in the town.

Afterwards commenced the publication of Dorling's Race Card, which has been printed ever since by the Dorling family. H. M. Dorling was managing director of the Epsom Grandstand Association and first chairman of the Epsom Urban Council.
