OVERSEAS MAIL ON TIME MAKES RUN IN 88 HOURS

Establishes Long Distance Record for Unbroken Trip by One Continuous Train.

Quebec, Sept. 21.—The Overseas Mail train reached here at 7 o'clock, six hours behind its schedule time, and an hour later the Canadian Pacific steamship, Empress of Britain, was on her way down the St. Lawrence for Liverpool.

The overseas train left Vancouver on Monday night at 7 o'clock, six hours behind its schedule, and arrived here to-day at 2 o'clock, having crossed the continent in 88 hours, allowing three hours for difference in time, or at an average speed of 35 miles an hour.

This is a long-distance record for an unbroken trip by one continuous train. The distance to be covered under the new mail contract is over 12,000 miles, and three-fourths of the mileage has been made sharp on time, leaving the Empress of Britain plenty of leeway to land the Oriental mail within the stipulated 30 days.

The Empress carried 180 first-class passengers, of whom 17 were from the Orient, 115 second-class and 150 third.

Canadian Pacific officials are naturally jubilant over the easy fulfillment of a fact that some imagined was beyond accomplishment.

FARMER CRUSHED BY TEAM

Falls From Wagon Tongue Under Horse's Hoofs.

Lakefield, Sept. 21.—Isaac Manning, a prominent farmer of Smith Township, died this afternoon from injuries received by his team running away this morning.

He was assisting a neighbor to haul grain to the threshing, and in attempting to adjust the reins, which had got under the wagon pole, he fell between the horses, which took fright and ran away.

The horses trampled on him and the wagon passed over him, severely crushing him. He died in four hours. Four doctors attended him.

CHILD DIES FROM BURNS

Winnipeg, Sept. 21.—(Special).—Playing near a gas stove, a little 5-year-old daughter of Thomas Goddard caught fire, and as the result of burns, died this afternoon. There was no one near at the time and her clothes were nearly burned off. She suffered terribly.

AIMS OF C. M. A.

Preference for Mother Country and Adequate Protection as Well.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Sept. 21.—The Manchester Guardian, commenting on the congress of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at Winnipeg, says they wish two things, substantial preference for the mother country and a minimum tariff, which shall afford them adequate protection against the same mother country.

We have no desire to question the benevolent feelings of the Canadian manufacturers towards us. We have no doubt that the two aims are in their eyes as transparently honest as they are transparently simple. Still, we cannot help feeling somewhat aggrieved at the Canadian manufacturers. It is flattering to us to assume that none of us can see thru the gap between these two rungs of the fiscal ladder.

WAS ENGINEER INSANE?

Grantham Disaster Repetition of That at Salisbury.

London, Sept. 21.—With an insane man at the throttle, it is thought, the Scotch express wrecked yesterday flew thru the station at Grantham, against the signals, failed to take a sharp curve, leapt a bridge and rolled down the embankment.

It was a repetition of the Salisbury disaster. The train should have taken the curve at not more than ten miles an hour; it was going forty miles an hour.

The authorities do not think that the brakes failed. Mental aberration on the part of the engineer is the only explanation they can offer.

EDICT AGAINST OPIUM.

Chinese Order Abolition of Use Within a Decade.

Peking, Sept. 21.—As a result of the combined recommendations of the Chinese commissioners who recently made a tour of the United States and Europe and Yuan-shikai, commander-in-chief of the forces, and Tang Shaohai, vice-president of the board of foreign affairs, an edict has been issued ordering the abolition of the use of opium, both foreign and native, within a decade.

The edict strongly condemns the vice and commands the council of state to devise regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition against opium smoking and the cultivation of the poppy.

TERRORISTS IN AN AUTO PUT OUT OF HARM'S WAY

After Several Weeks' Pursuit, Police Make an Important Seizure.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 21.—According to the newspapers the mysterious automobile which the police have been trailing for several weeks, in the belief that it belonged to revolutionists, and was being used as a base for terrorist conspiracy, has been seized in the city of the palace of Grand Duke Nicholas Nicolaievitch at Peterhof. The machine bore a false number.

The passengers were armed and could not properly identify themselves.

This automobile was first observed at the military manoeuvres at Krasnoye Selo, which the emperor attended. An order was then issued to capture the machine and the two soldiers who attempted to detain it were met with revolver shots. The machine got away.

Last week it appeared in St. Petersburg, repainted, and passed repeatedly under the windows of Premier Stolypin's apartments in the winter palace. It again turned up at Peterhof during the funeral of Gen. Trepoft.

The most daring exploit of this machine is reported to have occurred at Tsarskoe Selo, where the motorists are said to have crashed thru a fence surrounding the little palace and made a rapid trip thru the enclosure and out again, presumably in rehearsal for an attempt on the life of the emperor after his return from the present cruise in Finnish waters.

Launch of Leviathan Ocean Liner.

The White Star Line have received a cable from their Liverpool office, announcing the successful launching this morning of their new steamer Adriatic. She will be the largest vessel in the White Star fleet, being of greater tonnage than the Baltic of the same line. She will be equipped with all the latest modern improvements, and is expected to take her place in the regular New York-Liverpool service next May.

How to Make a Child's Hair Curl.
Straight hair is certainly not becoming to small children, however pretty the color may be, and nurses may be excused if they resort to fair means so as to induce a natural curl in babyhood. It has often been noticed that where a little care has been taken to foster an inclination towards wavy hair in earliest youth this has resulted in a becoming growth in later years, and by means of brushing and washing the head in the correct fashion, much may be done to encourage a tendency to curl when the child is young.

A baby's hair should always be brushed upwards instead of downwards, and, as each lock is treated, it should be given a little twist with the finger, this operation having a particularly good and lasting effect when the hair is damp. Persevered in daily, this will be found to work wonders, even in cases where the natural growth was perfectly straight, although it must be noted that, for the first week or two before the hair has become accustomed to the upward trend, the effect is hardly visible.

BADLY BITTEN BY INSECTS

NIMROD-CLERGYMAN DIES

Had Hunted World Over and Passes Away, Alone, in Mexican Wilds.

New York, Sept. 21.—A despatch from Mexico City says that without friends or physicians at his bedside Rev. Robert Jenkins Nevins, rector of St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church in Rome, N.Y., died at the Mexican capital yesterday from a complication of diseases.

Dr. Nevins returned from a hunting trip in Guerrero a week ago, suffering from bites and stings of insects, fever, hot country and a severe attack of malaria fever, combined with a bad cold, besides the effects of the accident to him in Chicago, when four ribs were broken, which had never properly knitted.

When Dr. Nevins went to Guerrero he disregarded the advice of his friends to avoid his body with a preparation affording protection from insects, the result being that he was rightfully bitten, blood poisoning developing.

Dr. Nevins was an enthusiastic sportsman, having hunted wild game in Africa, India, China, Japan, Manchuria and Siberia. The object of his trip to Mexico was to give his two nephews, Francis B. Sayre and John Nevins Sayre of South Bethlehem, Pa., an opportunity to hunt big game.
