JUNCTION COUNCIL ARE AFTER ENGINEER

School Trustees Are Busy Finding Rooms—East Toronto Council Are Cautious.

TORONTO, Junction, Sept. 9.—Three men, Frank Handy, Edward Handy and Richard Rodgers, were arrested to-night at Bartlett-avenue, Dovercourt, by County Constable Tomlinson and Police Constable Gooderham. The men were charged with theft and assault. They were shortly afterwards released on bail.

A little boy about three years old was found wandering alone on Annet-street to-night and was taken to the home of Chief of Police Flintoff on Pacific-avenue, where he will be kept till claimed by parents.

Tenders for the printing of the voters' list were awarded to-day. There are 4000 names on this year's list, an increase of 700 over last year.

There have been so many accidents on the railways lately that many young men in the Junction who are railway employes complain that they are almost afraid to go on duty, not knowing what will befall them before they return home.

The management committee of the school board met to-night. The arrangements for a teacher to succeed Chas. L. Barnes, resigned, have so far been unsuccessful, so the committee decided to advertise again.

Arrangements were made for the purchase of fifty new desks for the collegiate institute.

At a meeting of the board of works, to-night, Samuel Lawrence completed arrangements for a sewer on Roehampton-avenue, causing the water to run into his cellar. Relief was granted. Johnston & Jennie tendered for the sewer on Davisville-avenue for \$149, which was accepted, and a recommendation was made to the council.

The majority of the trustees present favored the idea and thought an investigation would be advisable.

A sub-committee was appointed to confer with the supervisor of schools regarding ways and means to relieve the overcrowding.

The committee had arranged to discuss certain matters in connection with the management of Carleton school. As Principal Jewett, however, was absent on account of illness the matter was held over.

At the regular meeting of the town council to-night there was a heated discussion, the councilmen all appearing to be in the proper frame of mind for argument.

The chairman, Councilor Hahn, repeatedly warned that he be called the discussion short and get thru with the work.

Councilor Irwin reported that the catch basins on Dundas-street are built without any foundations and being in many cases in the line of travel of pedestrians are a menace to the public comfort and safety, and also that these basins in many cases are without sufficient fall to catch the water.

Councilor Irwin also objected to the manner in general in which the present engineer was conducting the work, and recommended that he be dismissed or that his resignation be accepted. After a warm discussion, a resolution was passed by the council appointing to inspect and supervise the work of paving Dundas-street. The motion was placed on file.

There were eight tenders received for the construction of the new fire hall. These tenders were referred to the property committee.

A petition was received from Mr. Cowan asking for a sidewalk on Clara-street. He agreed to pay half the cost of construction, so the council agreed to the petition, after the street engineer had examined the work that is to be done.

Mr. Taylor of Utley-street asked that 25 feet of the grand stand at the north side and changed to the south side, so that the stand would not be in front of his residence and prevent him from getting a reasonable price for his property. The petition was referred to the property committee, which meets next Monday evening.

Lively Contest for Presidency is Expected at Winnipeg Next Week.

Attacks on Japanese No Surprise to London, Who Have Long Feared Outbreak.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The news of the attacks on the Japanese and Chinese at Vancouver did not surprise the colonial and foreign office officials here, who had long feared an outbreak against the Asiatics in Western Canada, but they have the greatest confidence in the ability of the Canadians to suppress any disturbances and protect aliens.

At the same time, the officials realize that a most serious problem has arisen particularly as the feeling appears to be strongest against the subjects of Great Britain's ally, and that it requires the most careful handling, for whatever action is taken is likely to be resented either by the colony or by Japan.

The question has been under consideration for some time by the imperial authorities, who have used their good offices on numerous occasions to prevent the outbreak of anti-Japanese legislation by British Columbia. It is understood that the matter was discussed at length during the recent visit of the colonial premiers to London, Australia being as much opposed to the admission of Asiatics as are the Canadians.

No steps were taken at the time, however, and the subject was allowed to lapse until the agitators were revived.
