A number of gentlemen have for some time been quietly, but none the less effectively, working to this end, with the result that the attention of capitalists has been directed to Sydney, which is considered one of the most suitable sites in Canada for a shipbuliding yard.

The presence of the steel works and the proximity of Sydney to cheap fuel and the advantages of the harbor all combine to make Sydney's claim to the best location practically unanswerable. In addition to its natural advantages, Sydney proposes to ald and encourage the new industry by substantial assistance, which cannot be overlooked.
