Montreal, July 14.—(Special.)—Following negotiations between the different banks and the department of finance at Ottawa, it now looks as if the Dominion would in the near future be rid of a good part of American silver, which has caused not a little trouble to the banks and business men generally of the Dominion and especially to the Canadian Northwest.

This is not the first attempt to free this country of abnormal quantities of American silver. As far back at 1870, the late William Weir relieved the Dominion of foreign silver to the extent of \$2,000,000. It was also in 1869 that Mr. Weir, acting independently of the government, but supported by the Canadian business community, secured the redemption of two lots of \$250,000 each of American silver. minion would in the near future be rid


