CROSS ALONE WILL STAND FOREVER

Dr. Wharton Says It's the Only Thing in Which to Place Faith—Helping One Another.

Last night's evangelistic meeting in the Jubilee Rink was much more largely attended than any of the previous services, except that of Sunday evening. It was also marked by great enthusiasm. The usual song service was conducted before the commencement of the regular service.

Dr. Wharton read the following portion of the sixth chapter of Galatians: "Brethren, if any man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness, considering thyself lest thou also be tempted."

"In other words, when a man is down, do not jump on him with both feet, but get both hands under him, and lift him up," said Dr. Wharton.

"There are burdens which you can help one another bear. When a man is hard up, he can help him; when it comes to bearing the burden of living our lives, we have to bear it all alone," Dr. Wharton then read further from the chapter, and coming to the verse, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap," he said:

"Sow wheat, you get wheat; sow oats, you get oats; and sow whisky or liquor, you become drunkards."

Several other verses of the chapter were read, and explained by the speaker.

Before commencing his discourse proper, Dr. Wharton asked all to come this (Friday) evening and enjoy an hour's service. He also announced that a street meeting would be held on Saturday evening, and that every afternoon next week a meeting would be conducted in the First Congregational Church.

Dr. Wharton spoke, in part, as follows:

"I beg your consideration tonight of the fourteenth verse of the sixth chapter of Galatians, which says: 'But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me and I unto the world.'"

"They say that every man has his hobby. Well, every man has to have something to center his enthusiasm on. There is no chance for success in any walk of life unless we have enthusiasm."

"What is true of us all is true of every individual Christian. Religion will stand just as far down the line as you place it. If you look into the lives of good Christians, you will find that they put their religion before everything else in life."

"Paul, who was a very wise man, came to the conclusion that there was only one thing in this world on which a man can center all his enthusiasm, and that is his Christianity, and yet there are some people who seem to put money and business ahead of everything else."

"This age is one of wonderful prosperity, and everyone is apparently thriving and making money. Now, Christ did not say that we were not to make money, but that we were not to put money before him. And yet there are some people who would place all else before Christ in their lives."

"Of all the hard jobs which a preacher has to do, the hardest is to preach a man to heaven when he has gone to hell, and yet there are many people who want a preacher to smooth everything over for a deceased relative, when he perfectly well knows that the man's spiritual welfare was such that he could not escape eternal punishment."

"There are some people who will wake up on the resurrection morning and think that they are in the wrong grave. They will not recognize the epitaph on their own grave-stone."

"How much I would like to help you young people to find pleasure. But the true cup of pleasure is not to be found in the pleasures of this world. Don't set your heart on the follies of this life. The only true source of pleasure is Jesus Christ."

"God forbid that I should run down my own race, but you do not know who your friends are. Wait until you get into trouble and you can count all your friends on the fingers of one hand. Oh, I believe tonight that there is but one God, and that is God."

"When we look upon the things of this world there is nothing but what we can write upon: 'This will spoil with the using.'"

"There is only one thing in which we can place our faith, and which will stand forever, and that is the cross."

"God's justice has placed the cross on Calvary, and that is why I glory in the cross."

"The fires of the wrath of a just and holy God spent their fury on the cross at Calvary, and now the Christian can look upon a world of lost and dying sinners without dreading, feeling that he has been saved for all eternity."

"I sometimes think that we are bearing altogether too lightly the burdens of our professions. We are not making use of our opportunities to win souls for Christ."

"At this juncture, Dr. Wharton told a very pathetic story of a drunken

J. P. MORGAN BUYS GREAT COLLECTION

Objects of Art Now on Their Way From France to the U. S.

New York, May 23.—J. Pierpont Morgan has purchased in Paris for more than \$1,000,000 the great Hoentschel collection of carvings, statuary and furniture, considered by experts the greatest assemblage of objects of the applied arts and crafts in the world.

Concerning the negotiations and sale of it, the greatest secrecy, it is said, has been maintained for months, owing to a belief that if it became definitely known it was sold to an American an effort would be made by the authorities abroad to prevent its leaving France.

Many of its carvings, panels and paintings were taken in times of violence from churches, cathedrals and palaces and others are of such importance that there was good ground for the apprehension that they might be in some way detained.

Mr. Morgan has not as yet decided what disposition he may make of the collection, but it is believed that he has already given a part of it to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, of which he is president.

TO ACT AS COADJUTOR

Bishop Reeves May Assist Archbishop Sweetman This Summer.

Toronto, May 23.—It is rumored in Anglican Church circles that Bishop Reeves, of MacKenzie River, intends to spend his furlough in Toronto, and while in the city will act as coadjutor to Archbishop Sweetman.

For some time past the question of appointing a coadjutor to the archbishop has been considered by a committee appointed to deal with the matter. But for some reason nothing has been done. It is expected, however, that as a result of Bishop Reeves' visit something definite will likely follow in the matter of appointing a bishop to relieve the archbishop of his arduous duties.

TWO-CENT RAILWAY RATE

Baldwin's Bill Passed N. Y. Senate Now Goes to Governor.

Albany, N. Y., May 23.—By a vote of 37 to 9 the Senate today passed the bill of Assemblyman Baldwin fixing at 2 cents a mile the rate of passenger fare on all railroads or railroad systems over 160 miles in length in this state. It has already passed the assembly and now goes to the governor.

The bill would affect the entire New York Central system, the Erie, Lackawanna, Lehigh Valley, Pennsylvania, and Delaware and Hudson lines in this state.

The New York, Ontario and Western is already operated under a 2-cent rate.

ANALYST RETIRING

Ottawa, May 23.—Thos. Macfarlane, Dominion analyst, is retiring after 15 years service. Anthony McGill, his assistant will succeed him. The latter has 20 years service to his credit.

MUST ADMIT CONSTABLE

Ottawa, May 23.—A. Gould, Hotel-keeper, was fined \$50 and costs for not immediately admitting a constable in uniform to his premises on demand. The constable had suspicions of violation of the law in the saloon at 5 o'clock in the morning.

DISCOUNTING OF NOTES

Magistrate Denison Strongly Criticizes Some Banks' Methods.

Toronto, May 23.—In the police court today James H. Drinkwater, of Centerton, was arraigned on the charge of forging the name of his uncle, Frank Wait, of Cobourg, to a note of \$400. Wait admitted the existence of such a note, but when asked if the signature attached was his replied "it was supposed to be mine."

"This seems to be pretty well worked," said Magistrate Denison. "A bank manager at Centerton discounted the note," said Crown Attorney Corley.

"It is a common habit of bank managers to discount forged notes," remarked his worship. "If they were sent to jail for a while it would do them good."

The magistrate thereupon remanded Drinkwater until Tuesday, and directed that the Centerton bank manager and everybody else concerned be present.

CANADIAN VICE-PRESIDENT

North American Baptist Convention Chooses Officers.

Norfolk, Va., May 23.—The Baptist convention of North America adjourned today.

A. Armstrong, of New York, president of the Rochester Theological Seminary, and president of the convention, Charles Hughes, of New York, vice-president, and A. L. Crimmin, of Canada, third vice-president.

Before the convention adjourned the delegates from Canada requested the delegates to visit the Canadian building at the close of the session and sing "God Save the King" under the Union Jack. The request was approved.

It was decided to raise \$100,000 with which to erect a Baptist theological seminary in Russia.

LAY DEAD IN A CREEK

Body of Supposed Tramp Found by Brighton Hand Near Brighton.

Brighton, Ont., May 22.—Grand Trunk Section Foreman Griffin found a man lying face downward, dead, in a small creek about three miles west of Brighton, this morning. Deceased had nothing whatever on him by which he could be identified. He was a man about 60 years of age, with hair and whiskers half gray, 5 feet 7 or 8 inches in height, and weighed about 180 pounds. He had every appearance of being a tramp. Corner Sanford found no marks of his having been struck by a train or of violence, and deemed an inquest unnecessary. The supposition is that the man either committed suicide or had a fit and fell into the creek.

EXILES INVADÉ SALVADOR

The Long-Expected Revolution Has at Last Broken Out.

New Orleans, La., May 22.—A cablegram from Nicaragua to M. Echeverria, announces that the expected revolution in Salvador has finally broken out. News is meager, but it is understood that Gen. Alfaro, an exile from Salvador, has, in accordance with plans, crossed into Salvador with an army of exiles, and that a revolution has been inaugurated in Salvador in his interests.

The revolution was arranged some weeks ago, when Alfaro, of Salvador, Toledo, of Guatemala, went from New Orleans to Nicaragua, and after a conference with President Zelaya, determined on starting two simultaneous revolutions: Alfaro in Salvador and Toledo in Guatemala. It is impossible to state the exact date of the revolution, but it is believed that the revolution broke out in the morning.

FOX AS A DECOY.

Some thirty years ago a tame fox was kept at the Berkeley Castle decoy in Gloucestershire.

HEN WENT WITH FOX.

When one of his farmhands entered the hencoop the fox sprang into the bag. Eleven fine fowl lay dead, four were badly maimed, and had to be killed, and the unharmed fowls cackled loudly.

The farmer took the fox and the dead fowls and drove to Marbury Hall to show them to the Hunt Pottery and secretary.

When the bag was opened the fox appeared, a hen walked out after the fox, an egg rolled out on the floor, and, of course, the farmer was puzzled. The fox in his flight from the hencoop knocked the bag into the bag, where the egg was laid.

Highlanders Reached City at Two o'Clock This Morning—Holiday Travel.

The special train having on board the Forty-eighth Highlanders, of Toronto, reached the city at two o'clock this morning over the Grand Trunk.

The train comprised thirteen first-class coaches, and immediately on arrival at the East London depot the troops detrained and marched to the fair grounds, where several of the exhibition buildings had been prepared for them. Everything necessary to ensure the comfort of the men was provided.

The regiment is nearly six hundred strong, and is accompanied by its celebrated brass band, led by Bandmaster Slater (brother of Bandmaster Slater, of the Seventh), and its pipe band.

The holiday travel on the various railways is as heavy as is customary on holidays. So far as London is concerned, it is found that the number of persons coming to the city is greater, owing to the presence of the Highlanders, while the number going to other places from London to spend the day shows a falling off, though very slight.

Every out-going train on the Grand Trunk yesterday afternoon and evening had extra coaches, and in spite of this provision it was impossible to put on enough cars to ensure seats for all the passengers. Some of the through trains were run in two sections, so great was the crush, yet everyone was taxed to the limit.

The company had two big contracts to fill. One was to bring the Forty-eighth Highlanders to London from Toronto, and the other was to carry the Ninety-first Highlanders from Hamilton to Woodstock.

The special used to convey the Kilties to London was sent back to Hamilton at three o'clock this morning to take the Ninety-first to Woodstock.

NEW TIME CARD, JUNE 2.

The new time card is expected to go into effect on the Grand Trunk on June 2. It was under consideration in Toronto again yesterday, and the changes in the service will be announced shortly. It is understood that No. 7 express, now due here from the east at 3:30 a.m., will be run in two sections in future. The Montreal section will run to London via Stratford, with the Lehigh Valley section, coming via Suspension Bridge and Hamilton. LAVISH HAND IS ATTACKED

Mother of Winston Churchill Tells of Society Menace.

London, May 23.—The mother of the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, under secretary for the colonies, who formerly was Jennie Jerome of New York, in contributing to Gentlewoman, a woman's periodical, articles on London society, is comparing past and present.

In the current number she says, among other things, that there is no doubt that luxury is greatly on the increase. The mode of living is becoming more extravagant everyday. A young couple who formerly thought they were well provided for if they had \$10,000 a year, barely subsist now on \$25,000 to \$35,000.

Everyone, she says, lives well. A bad dinner is a surprise. Houses are far better and more artistically furnished than in the past. Everyone entertains.

The hurry of the age is one of its chief characteristics. To crowd into twenty-four hours the occupation and amusements of a week seems to be the aim of most people. The extraordinary restlessness and craving for something new before there has been time to understand or enjoy what is in hand, is causing ministers to deteriorate and curtailing the amenities of social life, on which the past generations set such store.

One innovation which has arisen of late years is becoming a feature of London life, and that is the growth of women's clubs. That these supply a need is proved by their increasing numbers. Some, like mushroomrooms, quickly in a night and disappear as quickly. Others, more enduring, have

Severe Wintery Weather Damages the Fruit and Field Crops.

Berlin, May 23.—Frost, rain and hail have done considerable damage to the fruit and field crops in southwestern Germany during the last three days.

A hailstorm yesterday evening devastated the region around Muhlhausen, Alsace. The ground was covered a foot deep.

Frost has ruined many of the Moselle vineyards, and the mountainous districts of the North and Middle Rhine also suffered severely.

Heavy snow fell Sunday on the Giant Mountains, Southern Silesia, and snow fell yesterday over the Thuringian forest.

A tornado, accompanied by rain, occurred yesterday at Dirschau, West Prussia. Many trees were leveled and one church tower was blown down.

Since Saturday the temperature here has repeatedly fallen below freezing point.

Dispatches received from Switzerland say that snow has fallen heavily over the Alps.
