RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE IN EAST MUST WAIT FOR BETTER GROUND

Could Not Have Started Yet,
Says Maurice.

LONDON, May 10.—In his weekly
statement today, Major-Gen. Maurice
says:

"The Germans claimed that by their
so-called strategic retreat they in-
flicted a great defeat on the British in
respect to their plans, and that the
Teutons held the situation in their own
hands. Let me point again to the fact
that the British plans for the Arras
offensive were completed in February,
before the German retreat began. De-
spite the German claims, we have con-
tinued our offensive according to the
plans prepared.

During the month since the offensive
began we have taken twice the number
of prisoners, four times the amount of
ground, and five times the number of
guns, taken in the Somme offensive.
The British and French between them
have captured some 50,000 prisoners and
450 guns. If this is the result of a de-
feat, then we are willing to go on being
defeated. We have kept on going, and
we are going to keep on going. The
Arras offensive is much bigger than the
Somme, and our next offensive will be
bigger than Arras.

"Regarding the German casualties, it
is impossible, of course, to give figures,
but there is no disputing the fact that
they have been incalculable and incom-
parably larger than ours."

Gen. Maurice was asked whether the
Germans appeared to have withdrawn
troops from the eastern front for use in
the west. He replied there was no in-
dication of this. On being asked whether
the Russian crisis was causing any un-
easiness in Allied military circles, he
said:

"Naturally there must be some un-
easiness until the new Government is
firmly on its feet. But it must be re-
membered that even had there been no
revolution the Russians could not have
started an offensive before this because
of the condition of the Russian army.
The Russian winter campaign, in fact,
conditions are not yet favorable for
operations in the east."

Longford's Member At Present Serving Three-Year Sentence

Successful Candidate Sent to
Prison After 1916 Dub-
lin Riots.

LONDON, May 10.—Joseph McGuin-
ness, the newly-elected Sinn Fein mem-
ber of the House of Commons, and
Longford, is serving a three-years' sen-
tence in Lewes prison. He was
convicted in connection with the Dublin
riots last year.

ASQUITH CONDEMNS SECRET SESSION AS QUITE UNNECESSARY

Nothing Told Which Needed
To Be Hidden.

LONDON, May 10.—The official re-
port of the secret session of Parlia-
ment leaked tonight, says that Wm.
Spencer Churchill opened the discus-
sion and dealt with the general military
situation, with special reference to the
position in Russia, the development of
the struggle on the western front, the
strength of the United States and the
question arising out of the submarine
attacks.

"The losses of personnel and materi-
al," the statement continues, "was
commented on and the general situa-
tion in the Balkans discussed. Suggestions were made for
meeting the submarine danger, and fur-
ther information was asked concerning
marine losses and food supplies."

General Henry Page Croft and
George James Wardle continued the
debate.

Premier Talks Freely.

"The premier dealt serenely and fully
with the points Mr. Churchill raised.
He commented upon the internal po-
sition in Austria and the military po-
sition in Germany, in respect to her re-
sources, contrasting it unfavorably with
our own. He cited opinions of the Rus-
sian and French military chiefs as to
the results of the recent combined op-
eration on the western front.

"The premier then explained how it
was proposed to satisfy the war de-
mands for further reserves and also
the figures of the British tonnage sunk
month by month since last August
and gave an encouraging account of the
methods adopted to meet the subma-
rine attacks. He announced the
figures of the new tonnage which could
and would be built during the next
twelve months.

"Upon the food question the premier
pointed out that with judicious econ-
omy in consumption and increased pro-
duction in home supplies there need
be no alarm as to starvation and that
in 1918 we should be self-supporting.
There appeared to him no necessity to
re-state the Allies' war aims, which
were well known and were the same
as had been repeatedly stated during
the last two years.

"Herbert H. Asquith, (the former
premier), who followed Mr. Lloyd
George expressed his full agreement
with the premier, but deprecated the
secret of the sitting in which he af-
firmed, hardly anything had been said
which could not have been said open-
ly. He concluded by inviting the pre-
mier to publish to the country the
greater part of his speech."

THIRTY PER CENT INCREASE IN U.S. EXPORTS TO ALLIES

Figures for Second Month of Un-
restricted Warfare Are Big.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—American
exports to Europe in March, the second
month of unrestricted submarine war-
fare, showed an increase of more than
20 per cent over February. A com-
merce department report today esti-
mated March shipments at a value of
\$58,500,000 against \$48,750,000 in Feb-
ruary.

ASSASSINS ATTEMPTED TO SLAY CUBAN PRESIDENT

HAVANA, May 10.—An attempt was
made last night to assassinate Presi-
dent Menocal of Cuba by means of a
bomb. Nine arrests were made before
the conspirators could carry out their plan.

MOSCOW COMMITTEE IS OPPOSED TO GOVERNMENT

Does Not Like Coalition and Wants
All Russian Congress.

LONDON, May 10.—A Reuter dis-
patch from Moscow says that the local
executive committee of the workmen's
and soldiers' delegates is opposed to
the idea of a coalition government, and
advocates the immediate summoning of
an all-Russian congress of soldiers' and
workmen's delegates.

AUSTRIAN ENVOYS ON PEACE MISSION

LONDON, May 10.—The Am-
sterdam correspondent of the
Exchange Telegraph Company
wires that he has learned from
the best of sources that three
prominent Austrian politicians
are about to leave for Switzer-
land bearing peace proposals,
and that they hope to be given
safe conduct to France in order
to discuss with the French cabi-
net the possibility of peace.

HEARSAY REPORTS THE MAIN EVIDENCE AT STONING PROBE

Col. Wigle Continues Inquiry
Into Fraserville Charges.

Quebec, May 11.—Col. Wigle, with
Col. Ostell and Major Barkley, con-
tinued yesterday afternoon at Fras-
erville, the federal inquiry into the
charges that troops had been
stoned at Fraserville, and that soldiers
were abused at that place. At yester-
day morning's sitting no witnesses had
come forth to establish specifically the
stoning of troops, and yesterday
afternoon no one came out with a sworn
statement. The whole thing turns out
so far to have been a "hearsay" state-
ment.

H. R. White, manager of the Bank
of Montreal at Fraserville, appeared
yesterday afternoon and said he was
told that stonings had been carried out
by a troop train. The president of the
commission asked Mr. White to produce
the man who had told him of seeing
the stoning of the train, but Mr. White
said the man died with cholera, and he
knew that he had told of seeing the
stoning. The president insisted on
having the witness called with a view to
cross-examination, and Mr. White left
the courtroom to get in touch with his
informant, but a few minutes later
telephoned the court that the alleged
witness of the affair could not go to
court.

What was established yesterday
morning, i.e., that civilians had been
abused by soldiers because they were
not enlisted, was repeated in the after-
noon.

PROFESSOR SWETE DEAD.
LONDON, May 11.—Rev. Dr. Henry
Barclay Swete, eminent biblical scholar,
divinity, Cambridge University, died
Thursday. He was born in 1835 and
was the author of numerous works on
religious questions.

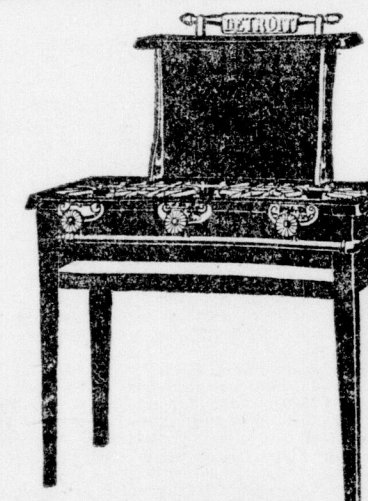
