



#### AT NINE TONIGHT ARMENIA'S DOOM APPARENTLY NEAR

Tomorrow's Exodus of British Troops "Beginning of End."

Paris, Aug. 15 .- The peace conference is awaiting anxiously the decision of Great Britain as to the withdrawal of British troops from the Caucasus. The "Proud to accept invitation and address, providing arrangements do not conflict with visits of minister of minitia. It was arranged that I proceed direct to Ottawa."

No further word has been received from the Caronia, which is bringing Gen. Currie to Canada, since the message of yesterday mogning stating that the steamer would dock at 9 o'clock tonight. Preparations for the reception are proceeding as originally planned. If Gen. Currie decides to board his train at the ship's side the address and plate will be presented at the pier.

RUMANIA DENIES

IS awaiting anxiously the decision of Great Britain as to the withdrawal of British troops from the Caucasus. The loneward movement is expected to begin tomorrow.

Col. William Haskell of the United States army, Allied high commissioner in Armenia, has telegraphed the suppresse council that Armenia undoubtedly will starve and the people be exterminated if the British soldiers are not detained there until others are sent. The supreme council, however, is unable to previde troops. None of the large powers is willing to send soldiers there, and consequently no action has been taken.

The relief supplies gathered at Tiflis, Batoum and Erivan probably will be lost if the British withdraw, and the investigation to be made by Major-Gen. James G. Harbord on behalf of the American Government will be of little use.


