ANNEXING THE EAST TERMS AND TERRITORY

How Toronto is Growing, According to the Official Wording of the Resolutions.

The movement for a greater Toronto involved in the annexation resolutions just passed by the city council is a live factor in the municipal life of the territories immediately affected. The residents are asking for details of the terms of annexation and of the steps which remain to be taken to complete the annexation proceedings.

So far as the Town of East Toronto is concerned the ratification of that municipality adopted a bylaw in 1907 in favor of annexation to the City of Toronto. It will only be necessary, according to the official view at the city hall, to send a copy of the East Toronto bylaw and a copy of the resolution of the Toronto City Council to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board for consideration.

As to the territory intervening, easterly and northerly of the city limits, and the district north of Danforth-avenue, referred to in the resolution, it will be necessary to procure a resolution for presentation to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board signed by at least one-half of the duly qualified ratepayers, asking the board to order annexation.

The resolution approving of annexation with East Toronto adopted by the council of the corporation of the City of Toronto on the 14th day of July, 1908, sets forth terms as follows:

Resolved, that this council do assent to the annexation to the City of Toronto of the Town of East Toronto, on the terms and conditions contained in bylaw No. 157 of the said town, which are hereby adopted, namely:

(a) That any sewerage system adopted by the board shall be constructed so as not to injure the property along the lake shore, or any property in town.

(b) That the local improvement debt for water mains and construction, and the general debt of the Town of East Toronto be drawn by the board in the name of the City of Toronto.

(c) That as soon as practicable after annexation the city shall seek to have the Toronto Street Railway service extended to the eastern part of the town, as part of the Toronto Railway System, at single fares.

(d) That the City of Toronto establish a street lighting system in the Town of East Toronto.

(e) That the present sewerage system of the Town of East Toronto be maintained and extended to the town, as part of the Toronto Railway System, at single fares.

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
