## YOUNG MEN ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF THEFT

Paid to Have Looted Canada Supply Co.—Arrested at Falls—City Council Grist.

HAMILTON, Feb. 21.—(Special).—At the request of the local police, Chief of Police of Niagara Falls, Ontario, this morning arrested Tom McCarthy, North McNab-street, and Edward Rock, on a charge of theft. They are young men about 21, and both belong to respectable families. It is charged that Saturday afternoon they entered the warehouse of the Canada Supply Company, and took watches, bracelets, brooches, rings, etc., to the value of \$190. They are acquaintances of the proprietor and the place showed no signs of having been broken into. It is supposed that they had keys to it. Some of the stuff, so the police say, was found on the pair and part of it was recovered here. As soon as the theft was reported and the warrant had been taken out by the proprietor, the police notified all the surrounding cities and towns. The pair were nabbed while sauntering about the Falls. Detective Campbell brought them back this evening.

The police were there in two Sunday drunks to-day.

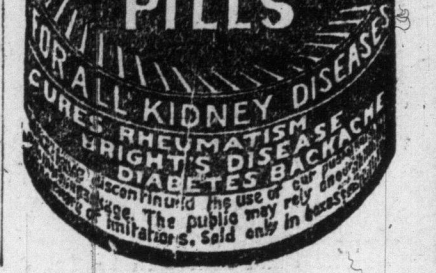
