Those in Charge Expect Final
Disposition of Measure
Wednesday.

Washington, Feb. 13.—The Fordney
emergency tariff bill was placed in
parliamentary position by the senate
last night for resumption of debate
on Wednesday, and leaders in charge an-
nounced that they expected its final
disposition by Wednesday.

After having been shunted aside for
several days to permit passage of ap-
propriation bills, the tariff measure
was made the order of business upon
reconvening of the senate on Wednes-
day. There was no ar-
rangement or understanding regard-
ing a final vote, but those in charge
said that they hoped to have the bill
disposed of in time for resumption
of work on appropriation bills next
Thursday.
