CHURCH OF STRANGER TO BECOME SYNAGOG

Western Congregational Report- ed to Be Sold for Seventy Thousand Dollars.

The Western Congregational Church, known as "The Church of the Stranger," at Spadina and Baldwin, is soon to be transformed into a Jewish synagogue, according to a report by S. Pulvers, which states that the church has recently been sold for \$70,000, the deal having been negotiated by S. Pulvers, business manager of the synagogue; L. Abramowitz, presi- dent, and P. R. Sweeney of the Con- gregational Church.

According to Mr. Pulvers few alter- ations will be necessary to convert the church into a synagogue, and he expects that it will be ready for occu- pancy about September 1.

The church, which was built in 1887, is of Gothic architecture and cost origi- nally altogether with land and organ, about \$20,000. The membership of the church has decreased lately due to the removal of many of the city, gregians to other parts of the city, and it is expected that a new Congre- gational church will be built in the west end to replace the one reported sold.

Rev. R. Bertram Nelles, the present pastor of the church, stated that the deal had not yet been finally com- pleted, but that there would be a meet- ing of the congregation on Thursday evening to decide the matter def- initely.

WHO OWNS VICTORY BOND?

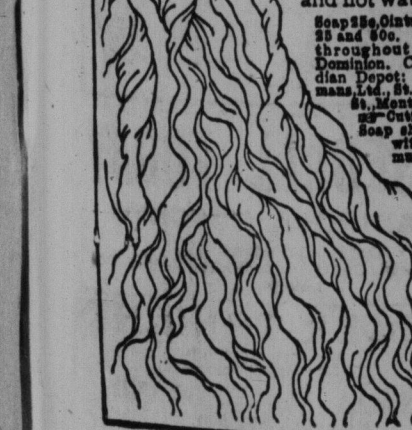

FIREMAN AN ENVOY OF U. S. SINN FEIN

Carried Letters and Firearms Addressed to Prominent Irishmen.

London, July 13.—William Barry, an Irish fireman on the steamship New York, pleaded guilty in the Bow street police court here this morning to in- tring the defence of the realm act by bringing in from the United States arms, ammunition and a number of letters. The latter were from Irish revolutionists, and were intended for ultimate delivery to Arthur Griffith, organizer of the Sinn Fein, and other Sinn Fein chiefs in Ireland. Barry was sentenced to two months' im- prisonment.

When Barry was first arraigned in police court on July 6, it was stated that besides the letters discovered on his person were 300 rounds of ammu- nition, were found on him.

Upon his arrest at Southampton on July 2, Barry declared the pistols, ammunition and letters discovered on his person were given him by an un- known man for delivery at a Liverpool address, which he claims was lost.

The magistrate, sentencing the prisoner, said he appeared to be "Pe- ter," who the police say, presumably is Michael Collins, Sinn Fein member of parliament for Cork; three letters ad- dressed to Arthur Griffith, two of them signed "James O'Mara," and the other signed "Noonan," one addressed to "McSweeney," whom authorities identify as the mayor of Cork and commander of the Cork brigade of the republican army, signed "Peter."

The letters presented to the court comprised a covering letter signed "John," and addressed to "Michael," who the police say, presumably is Michael Collins, Sinn Fein member of parliament for Cork; three letters ad- dressed to Arthur Griffith, two of them signed "James O'Mara," and the other signed "Noonan," one addressed to "McSweeney," whom authorities identify as the mayor of Cork and commander of the Cork brigade of the republican army, signed "Peter."

The letters reported failure of the Irish to obtain inclusion of their plank in the platform adopted at the Re- publican national convention in Chi- cago, and commented on the split be- tween the Cohanlan and De Valera groups. Noonan's covering letter, dated New York June 21, said: "An- other man will be going to London Wednesday; will send more news then."

Pistols and Ammunition.

Noonan's letter to Griffith recounted incidents prior to, during and since the Chicago convention. This letter, he said, was written at the instance of De Valera. O'Mara's letter to Griffith stated that efforts to get the Irish plank into the Republican plat- form were thwarted because "ground undermined by Cohanlan's group by the introduction of resolutions of re- spective sympathy," and said Cohanlan, Devoy, Diarmuid, Lynch and Richard Dalton were identified with this group.

One of the letters signed "Peter," and addressed to "Terry," paid tribute to De Valera's efforts on behalf of the Irish, and assailed Devoy. It asked that De Valera be bolstered up thro- passage of a vote of confidence by the "Irish republican parliament."

A letter purported to be written by "Noonan" to "Michael," said: "Am sending by this delivery two parcels. One containing 400 rounds of 8mm auto, the other containing three auto- matic revolvers, 48 rounds filling for same, two spare magazines and leather case. Will send more Wed- nesday."

A copy of De Valera's statement to the press, dated June 18, regarding the Chicago developments, was appended to one of the letters.

FARMERS "UP IN THE AIR"

Farmers, millers, dealers are all up in the air as far as fixing a price for this year's wheat is concerned. The decision is entirely in the hands of the government at Ottawa, who have made as yet no definite an- nouncement.

The wheat board, appointed by the government to deal with last year's crop is still operating and will do so until the date set for last year's crop. Whether they will be called into ac- tion to fix and regulate prices and sell- ing of the crop of 1920 depends upon the Ottawa government exercising the rights conferred on them at the recent session of parliament to instruct the wheat board by order-in-council to regulate the price and selling of this season's crop.

Open Trading in U. S.

Open trading in wheat is now going on in the States and new Kansas wheat has sold per New York deliv- ery at about \$2.55 a bushel. Local grain men think this would mean less than \$2.50 a bushel to the farmers. According to these dealers the Ont- ario farmer will be fortunate if he secures around that price for this year's crop. The export situation is conditioned by the fact that all Eu- ropean purchases are now in the hands of the various governments, thus elim- inating competition.

C. B. Watts, a Toronto member of the wheat board, stated yesterday that he had no information as to what the government was likely to do re- garding this year's crop, and that no date had yet been set to close the dealings of the wheat board for the 1919 crop. Another final partici- pating profit certificate will be issued by the wheat board later on to close out the crop of last season.

BRITISH LABOR BACKS UP IRISH

Special Trades Congress De- clares for Full Dominion Powers in Affairs.

London, July 13.—The special trades union congress called to consider la- bor's attitude on the Irish question, today adopted a resolution proposed by the National Union of Railwaymen, which asked the government to call a truce in Ireland and open forthwith an Irish parliament with full dominion powers in all Irish affairs, such adequate protection of minorities.

The resolution called upon the Irish people themselves to use their power to halt all murder and outrage. It was carried by a majority on a card vote of 184,000.

The proposal to employ direct ac- tion if necessary to force the govern- ment to withdraw its troops from Ire- land and cease manufacturing mun- itions for use in Ireland and Russia, was defeated.

Eight hundred delegates were pres- ent, representing 5,000,000 workers. The resolution in favor of direct ac- tion, which was proposed by the lead- er of the locomotive men, was defeated by a majority of 716,000 votes.

The congress later adopted a resolu- tion introduced by the Miners' Fed- eration, demanding the withdrawal of all the British troops from Ireland and the cessation of the manufacture of munitions to be used in Ireland and Russia. This resolution recommended a general strike if the government re- fused the demands, but the question of direct action will be left to a ballot of the members of the various unions. Thus the rank and file will have a chance to express their opinion.

GREEKS FIRED ON IN ITALIAN ZONE

Had Pursued Turkish Snipers Who Were Firing on Greek Trains.

Constantinople, July 13.—The Greeks suffered one officer killed, and thirty other casualties near Ephesus re- cently when they entered the Italian zone to capture Turks who were sniping at Greek trains.

The Italians objected and opened a machine-gun fire on the Greeks, who charged the Italians with fixed bay- onets and routed them.

Italian protests to the high commis- sioners here against Greek pursuit of Turkish nationalists into the Italian zone have been disregarded.

Gen. Paraskevopoulos, the Greek commander-in-chief, is in Constanti- nople conferring with Lieut.-Gen. Sir George Milne, commander of the allied troops in western Asia Minor. Many rumors are in circulation are concern- ing joint plans by the British and Greeks, in the French and Italian zones, not to participate.

The opinion is becoming general here that the Greeks probably will not advance much further to the east- ward, but the latest rumor is that the British will take over a portion of Anatolia. Under this plan the Greeks would occupy the outside Smyrna dis- trict and administer it as an auton- omous country, thus providing a barrier between the Greeks and Turks who are such bitter enemies that reconcilia- tion would be difficult if they were left on long, defenceless boundary.

WISHES TO CONSULT DOMINIONS' VIEWS

Britain Consents to Tempor- ary Renewal of Anglo- Japanese Alliance.

London, July 13.—The Anglo-Japan- ese treaty will be automatically re- newed for a period of one year, ac- cording to an announcement made in official circles this afternoon. It was the last day on which notice of the abrogation or modification of the alliance could be made.

According to an announcement in official circles this afternoon, today was the last day on which notice of the abrogation or modification of the alliance could be made.

It was also announced today by the league of nations, simultaneously with the notice of the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese compact, that the British and Japanese governments had ad- dressed notes to the league of nations on the subject of the renewal. The official explanation of the renewal is that the British government has not been able to communicate fully with the Canadian and Australian govern- ments on proposed alterations of the terms of the treaty. It was stated that the colonial representations would be taken up probably in Sep- tember or October.

There has been no reply on the part of the British government to the note of the Peking government, issued sev- eral weeks ago, in which the Chinese government reiterated its objections to some of the provisions of the Anglo- Japanese treaty.

TWO DAYS AFLOAT IN-FISHING DORY

Three Nova Scotians Have Harrowing Experience With- out Food or Water.

White Head, N.S., July 13.—Captain Young, his father, and Herbert Mor- ash, all of West Dover, returned to- day after a harrowing experi- ence. The men left West Dover, Halifax county, on Friday last, in the little fishing schooner Forester. They anchored the vessel on Quaro Bank, and on Sunday morning Captain Young and Mr. Morash left the schooner in a dory to look after their traps. A dense fog closed down and they lost direction, with the result that they drifted on the open sea until today, with neither food nor water.

The two men succeeded in making their way to White Head in a weak- ened condition, but otherwise appar- ently little the worse for their experi- ence.

The elder Young succeeded, with the assistance of an American fishing vessel, in bringing his fish schooner safely into Canada this afternoon.

Missionaries May Be In Danger in Bolivia

Rev. H. E. Stillwell, secretary,

stated yesterday that the Baptist mis- sion board had received no word for several weeks from the Canadian Ba- ptist missionaries in Bolivia, where it is feared that they are in danger on account of the revolution reported there.

The Canadian Baptist board of mis- sions has stations at La Paz, the capi- tal of Bolivia, and at two other central cities.

LABOR CANDIDATE OPENS CAMPAIGN

Edward Higgins, Returned Soldier, Makes Plea for Election to Legislature.

"All eyes are turned on Northeast Toronto," declared one of the speakers to a large gathering of comrades, to a sprinkling of ladies, who attended the meeting of the U.V.L. held in the Foresters' Hall, College street, last ev- ening. "What you accomplish in that constituency, and that will be a vic- tory of the Labor-Soldier candidate, will be a stimulus for every constitu- ency in the east and the west of the Dominion," he added.

Edward Higgins, the prospective Labor-Soldier candidate for North- east Toronto, placed his views before the meeting. He thought it degrading that patients should have to wait un- til investigations were made before being allowed to enter the hospitals, and advocated that these be govern- ment-owned, or run by the municipi- lity.

He was in favor of Hydro, but con- sidered the government right in hav- ing an investigation before spending money on a hydro-hobby. He asked the comrades to support the policy of the Soldier-Labor executive. He had some things to say about the way the political machine had treated such subjects as gratuity, re-establishment, pen- sions, etc.

Endorsed Candidate.

Rev. Mr. Tupper, editor of The Na- tional Veteran, made a stirring speech in which he paid tribute to the worth of Comrade Higgins, and urged all re- turned men to be united. The sol- diers, he said, should be actively in politics, and if it were not so serious, he looked upon it as a huge joke when they were advised not to do so.

He said this was the advice of a politician who "is a far-seeing guy." Mr. Tupper supported Comrade Flynn because he denounced what was wrong and supported what was right.

Dominion Secretary Ellis, of the G.A.U.V., told the meeting that ar- rangements had been completed for a thorough medical examination of all returned soldiers. This would take place at headquarters, 21 East Ger- ard street, on an appointment being made thru him. An unemployment bureau would also be opened today at the same address.

Mr. Ellis told why the returned sol- dier should affiliate with labor and farmers. Ninety per cent. of these number was recruited from labor, while five per cent. came from the farmer element. He said the differ- ences in their respective platforms were on minor matters only.

GERMAN DELEGATES ASSAULTED AT SPA

Journalists Come to Blows With Belgian Officer and Civilian.

Spa, July 13.—Some of the members of the German delegation have com- plained to Chancellor Fehrenbach of aggressions of which they claim to have been the victims since their ar- rival at Spa. One journalist attached to the German delegation came to blows with a former Belgian officer whose house he occupied at Spa dur- ing the war.

According to these claims, last ev- ening as the Germans were about to enter the orchestra struck up the British national anthem. When the Germans began singing in their na- tive tongue a Belgian civilian took of- fense and ordered them out. They re- fused to leave, but were finally ejected after a sharp scuffle, in which the same journalist received a blow over the nose with a cane.

The Belgian civilian ran out of the cafe just as Herr von Ehardt, editor

of The Hamburg Ebeblatt, and Herr Stockless, correspondent of the Wolff Agency, were passing. Recognizing them the civilian struck Stockless in the face with his cane, injuring the correspondent so severely he was con- fined to bed today. It is understood the German delegation will make re- presentations to the Belgian authori- ties regarding the affair.

NEW BUS FOR BRANTFORD.

Brantford, Ont., July 13.—(Special.)—The deal for the new bus to give a service to West Brantford has been closed. The bus will accommodate 20 passengers. It is thought that the service will be put on in ten days.

U. S. ADMIRAL DEAD.

Southampton, Eng., July 13.—Rear- Admiral Henry Tudor Brownell Har- ris, retired, died here last night. Admiral Harris arrived here on the steamer New York July 2, seriously ill.

Admiral Harris was born in Hart- ford, Conn., in 1846. He served in the navy during the civil war, and after- ward held various ranks in the navy.
