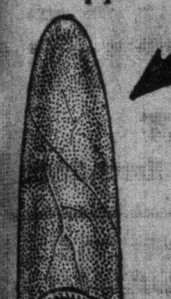

WILL BE GEERS OR MACEY

Both Trainers Have Fast Ones for the M. and M. Stake at Detroit.

DETROIT, June 25.—Two years ago Gus Macey and Ed. F. Geers fought it out in the Merchants' and Manufacturers' stake with Spanish Queen and Alceste, each mare winning two heats, but the race going to Macey's under the five-heat rule. It would not be at all surprising to see these veterans of the game in at the finish again this year, as each has a wonderfully fast five-year-old mare.

The recent trial mile in 2:30 by Lilly W. on the local track boosted the stock of Macey's entry. There is no question about her ability to trot fast and do it right. She went six heats one day this week, three of them in 2:15 or a little better. Macey not caring to stop her anywhere near her limit.

Pop Geers has not been saying much, but he has been a faster mile with Dudge Archdale than any of the trainers will run an M. and M. horse. Before leaving Memphis for Terre Haute, where he will stay some weeks, Dudge Archdale showed the grand old man a mile in 2:07, which is some pumpkin at this stage of the game.

Geers Has Fifteen. Geers is carrying fifteen horses with him this year, eleven trotters and four pacers, and it is safe to say that ten of them will start during the blue ribbon meeting. All of them have done well, and the best work up to the time of leaving Memphis is as follows:

Trotters—The Harvester, in 2:07; Dudge Archdale, in 2:07; Demos, in 2:04; Alceste, in 2:12; Ormonde, in 2:04; Louis Wilson, in 2:14; The Avon, in 2:15.

Pacers—Walter W., in 2:07; Direct Hal, in 2:07; and Halite Direct, in 2:10. The Abbe, in 2:10.

The Harvester has come along so well that there are a great many who believe he will be the stallion king of the year. There is also an impression that Walter W. will be one of the star pacers of the season, he has done so nicely in the past. Geers has not been as fast with his Chamber of Commerce pacers as with the M. and M. trotters, it is known that the veteran has a high opinion of The Abbe.

Lon McDonald's Horses.

Ed. Avery reached Detroit yesterday with four horses from Lon McDonald's stable. Avery is first trainer under McDonald, and one of the most competent and successful men in the business, always on the job, and wise to the ways of the trotter and pacer.

The horses went on to Pontiac, where they start next week at the opening of the short-ship circuit. They will race thru the early meetings, and finally land at the state fair grounds in high trot society. One of the lot is the mare Hazelwood, that McDonald entered in the \$100 stakes for 2:24 class trotters in the short-ship circuit.

Jeff Cunningham has moved his string from the state fair grounds to Pontiac, and others are going out there this week, the entry from the local training camp having been unusually large. This will mean first-class sport at Pontiac, and a good line on some of the horses that will be seen during the first week in August at the blue ribbon meeting.

The Picture Right Will Cost \$200,000 For the Big Fight

RENO, Nev., June 25.—The right to secure a pictorial report of "the battle of the century" will cost close to \$200,000, that is an estimated based on the price of the respective shares agreed upon by Jeffries, Johnson and Promoter Tex. Rickard. Jack Gleason, Rickard's partner in the staging of the big fight, is said to be the only one of those interested in the picture proceedings who has not disposed of his share of the prospective profits. Tex. Rickard last night definitely announced the sale of his and Jeffries' interests in the pictures for \$100,000 each, that sum having been placed on deposit in a Reno bank pending the fulfillment of a signed contract.

William T. Rock, representing an eastern syndicate, won the contest for their shares with a bid that topped by \$15,000 an offer reported made yesterday by San Francisco. According to Rickard, hardly had he and Jeffries attached their signatures to the agreement drawn up by Rickard's attorney, when the California rushed in with another bid of \$100,000. Jeffries is to receive two-thirds and Rickard one-third of the \$100,000.

According to the amended fight articles, Jeffries and Johnson are the joint owners of the picture rights, and each is bound to turn over to the promoters one-third of the profits each receives therefrom. With the picture rights split between rival syndicates, as now seems to be the case, it is likely that two sets of films will be made in order to carry out the terms of their contracts. All Jeffries and Johnson are required to do is enter the ring here July 4 and begin fighting. Rickard is required to use all his best efforts to see that the fighters come together. All other responsibility devolves upon the picture men.

Tex. Rickard said this morning that, according to information which he has received from the Southern Pac headquarters, he is inclined to believe that no diminution in the number of picture victors will result from the change of battle-grounds from San Francisco to Reno. The promoters estimate that each of the two will witness the contest will be 17,000.

Many complaints are being made by visitors desiring to inspect the fight grounds, and seeing the champion where Johnson is quartered it is necessary to secure an automobile or some other conveyance, as it is entirely off the line of the local trolley system, and is far out of reasonable walking distance.

Moana Springs, however, is touched almost directly by Reno's street cars, and for that reason many of the visitors to draw a much larger number of visitors than Johnson's. This condition of affairs is a source of regret, both to Jeffries and Johnson, for Jeffries dislikes, above all things, to work in public. On the other hand, nothing delights Johnson more than a big crowd, and it has come to be regarded as an established peculiarity of his nature, that he does his best boxing when stimulated by the presence of numerous spectators.

New York Sports Going to Fight. NEW YORK, June 25.—"On to Reno" is the cry of the sports, who are departing in large numbers today by the belle-ground of the Jeffries-Johnson fight. Fight followers have been leaving the city in small parties for several days, and one or possibly two special trains will probably leave here Monday for the fight grounds.

The action of Governor Gillett in making it impossible to hold the contest in California caused the cancellation of orders for several special trains. It is understood that New York will send about 300 spectators to the championship fight, while this number will be augmented by scores of British sports, who are expected here within a few days.

WILL BE HEARD JUNE 30

Toronto's Appeal on President Powers' Decision Set for June 30.

President J. J.
