Ald. Bullock Urges That Legislation be Secured to Provide for Them.

Two important matters occupied the attention of the school board last night. Ald. Bullock's urging that efforts be made to secure legislation at the next session making school books free to children all over the province, was passed and the superintendent, Dr. Bridges, was instructed to prepare a resolution asking that the legal school age under the compulsory law be reduced to fourteen, thus making it conform to the factory act.

Another matter decided on was that the outside doors of all schools which now open inwards should be changed to swing outwards.


