**BRAZILIAN SMELTERS EASIER IN MONTREAL**

Quotations Respond To Selling Pressure; Balance of Market Quiet, Firm

**NEW YORK, March 8—(Opening)—**

Irregular lower prices characterized the opening of the new week in the stock market. General Electric dropped 2 1/2 points, Jordan 2, and Pierce Arrow, Baldwin Locomotive, United Fruit and Allied Chemical yielded a point or more on initial sales. On the other hand Dupont, Schuylkill Stores and American Car and Foundry opened a point or so higher.

**IN MONTREAL**

MONTREAL, March 8—Under heavy selling orders Brazilian Traction Consolidated Smelters were easier during the first half hour's trading on the local exchange this morning. The former opened up a half at 95, but shortly after ceased to 91 1/2. Smelters opened down three points at 184. On the next sale it sold at 190, and then firmed to 192. The balance of the market was quiet and firm. Price Bids was up a half at 84 1/2. Shawinigan was up a like fraction at 181 1/2, and Twin City firmed 1/4 at 78.

Reports from the South indicate that fertilizer sales are considerably above last year, and this company's plan to take care of back dividends should be announced this evening.
