

POSTAGE CHANGE GOES INTO EFFECT

One Cent Tax, in Existence Since War Days, is Removed

From midnight Wednesday it is not necessary to place a three-cent stamp on a letter weighing no more than one ounce directed to any part of North America, parliament having revoked the one cent tax which has been in force since war time. For each additional ounce one cent is now charged for local letters and two cents for letters mailed to points on the continent. The term "continent" also includes Newfoundland.
