LEWES, Deleware, Nov. 18-All the passengers and crew of the burned Clyde Liner Lenape, except 20, who are aboard the coast guard cutter Kickapoo, have been landed here. Those aboard the Kickapoo also are expected to be brought here shortly. About 150 passengers and assembled here.

Many of the passengers had a narrow escape with their lives when the flames swept the vessel anev just as safety apparently was assured. Many were forced to jump side of the vessel on the ropes to killed and 19 others injured whescape the scorching heat. All were Northern Pacific passenger

The fire started in an after hold before 11 o'clock last night. It was not discovered until it had made considerable headway. Although S. O. S. calls were sent out immediately the first efforts of the crew to combut the flames appeared so successful that no attempt was made to remove passengers before reaching the breakwater. Proffers of assistance from several ships speeding toward the Lenape were declined, Captain Devereaux said.

Northerd Pacific passenger train, Gray's Harbor to Tacoma, went into the ditch two miles east of Olympia, shortly before 7 o'clock last night. P. X. Simpson, a bridge tender, aboard the wrecked train, said the locomotive was on its side over an embankment, with the baggage car piled on top. Simpson, despite a badly injured arm, ran to Olympia with news of the accident and a relief train bearing doctors and nurses was started for the scene.

The Lenape's life boats were dropped over the sides, as rapidly as the davits could be operated. Captain Steele gathered six in tow and rushed them to the pilot boat Philadelphia.

TAKEN FROM ROPES

Meanwhile passengers who had been unable to reach the boats, were dangling from the ends of ropes, over the sides, as close to the water as possible, to escape the scorching heat.

Captain Steele drove his craft under the blazing sides of the liner, and picked many of the struggling passengers from midair. Those who had dropped into the water, were lifted over the sides of the patrol boat.

When all had been rescued, he took in tow wall the remaining life boats in the water and placed his charges.

The prisoner's counsel asked for a jury to be sworn to consider the question whether the prisoner was in a fit state of mind to be tried.
