1,300,000 FRENCH SOLDIERS KILLED

New York, Aug. 7.—Marcel Knecht, member of the French high commission to the United States in an address today at the annual convention of the Knights of Columbus, said 1,300,000 French soldiers had been killed and 1,300,000 wounded in the war and that "the police" were wonderfully cheered by the arrival of the Americans.

The Rev. M. Borde Darrere, of Paris, the "Fighting Priest," who accompanied M. Knecht to the convention, was cheered by the delegates. Father Darrere has been wounded three times in battle.

Food Board Flashes For Feminine Folk

Are you insisting on getting wheat substitutes from your grocer and are you, as a housekeeper, drying them out in your kitchen? There is no use saying they are not available because with possible exceptions in some districts, they are, and if your dealer does not carry them then that is his fault and yours. Next week the largest substitute milling concern in Canada is to be opened at Peterboro by the Quaker Oats Company. Cornmeal, oat flour, oatmeal and corn-flour will be turned out at the rate of 7,000 barrels a day.

The darker the bread you have these days the more patriotic you are, so don't insist on getting light bread from your baker. On the contrary encourage him to go even further than the regulations specify in the use of substitutes.

ONE WHO TOOK PART

Stirring Address by Rev. George Adam at War Anniversary in Montreal

Rev. George Adam, a Scotch divine of the Congregational church, heard here with such acceptance in pulpits and on lecture platforms during the Y. M. C. A. campaign in the spring, is reported in the Montreal papers as having made a wonderful address on the war anniversary on last Sunday at which joint service Rev. Miles F. McCutcheon, formerly of this city, assisted.
