### REV. DR. McINTYRE GETS WORD OF CYCLONE IN

The news of extensive destruction wrought by a cyclone has been received from the missionaries in Hindoostan by Dr. W. E. McIntyre, secretary of the Baptist Foreign Mission Board. The cyclone occurred on Setpember 23 and swept the eastern coast for 200 miles from a point about eighty miles north of Sompet. Considerable damage was done to property and some lives were lost.

The missions at Chitacole escaped with comparatively little damage as the missionaries had profited by their experience six years ago when another cyclone destroyed their buildings.






