B., was awarded first prize for a suit of clothes at the Dominion Exhibition, but it was not allowed on account of coming in after the entries closed. The suit was bought by a gentleman of taste in the house of W. S. Symonds & Co., of Halifax.

NEW VOTES.—The Revisors of votes have had application made to them to add one hundred and twenty-six new names to the list of voters in this Parish. The names are now posted up at the office of W. A. Park, Esq., on the 25th inst., to adjudge thereon.—Advocate.

It is to be hoped that the Revisors, not only in Newcastle, but in all other Parishes of the County will do their duty faithfully and conscientiously in making or unmaking voters. One hundred and twenty-six names seem a great many to add to an electoral list in one parish and the fact that such a proposition is made shows either that the assessors have neglected their duty shamefully, or that a barefaced attempt is being made to manufacture votes in view of the general election for the local legislature next year.

Burglary and Window-Smashing.

The roughs were out in full force on last Wednesday night. They disturbed people living on Cunard street, where they smashed the windows of a house occupied by Mr. Fleming, breaking the bars of the safe of one window. Mr. Fleming is a quiet man, who could not have given any offence to these blackguards. The Municipal Elections.

Under the Act passed by the Local Legislature at its last session, it became necessary for all persons who are to be nominated for Councilorships to have their qualifications filed with the Parish or town clerk on or before Monday next. The portion of the new Act relating to the matter is as follows:—

The Candidates shall subscribe a declaration of nomination, and the same shall be filed with the Parish Clerk on or before the day preceding the day of election; and the names of the Candidates shall be by the Parish Clerk posted up in the most public place in each Polling District on the Thursday preceding said day of election, and shall be the event of election by the Polling Places during the day of election.

If only two Candidates are nominated in each Parish the Parish Clerk shall make return thereof to the Secretary-Treasurer within ten days after the day fixed for the election. If more than two are nominated, the election shall proceed as usual.

A large amount of valuable furniture and other property also prey to the flames, including a picture owned by Vanderbilt, valued at \$50,000. Total loss on this building and contents estimated at \$2,000,000.
