Most people forget the splendid defence of Canada, made early in the century, by the handful of Canadians—225,000, total population of Lower Canada, and 75,000 in Upper Canada—against the eight mil-lions of the United States. When England was involved in the struggle with Napoleon, its commerce ruined by the "Berlin Decrees" and the "Orders in Council," its army and navy engaged in Spain and the Balic.the States thought it a favorable opportunity for an-nexing Canada, and, in spite of all conces-sions, declared war. The Americans thought the war would be a mere promenade, and on July 12th, 1812, General Hull from Detroit issued a proclamation offering peace and liberty to Canada it it submitted, slavery and destruc-tion if it did not.


