Paris, Nov. 5.—Announcement is made of the death of Laurence Jereid, the correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph here, and the dean of the English correspondents in Paris. His death was due to pneumonia, following an attack of influenza.

Waterborough, Q. C., Nov. 5.—Miss Dorothy Grant, with her fiancé Mr. Vincent, adopted son of the late Mrs. Starkey, who lives near Young's Cove Road Station, were on a visit to Mrs. Starkey. When she arrived she was taken ill with the influenza and pneumonia, and died Saturday night. Miss Grant was from Halifax, and was the only daughter of Mrs. Starkey. Her father, T. Grant of Halifax, she was 23 years of age. The sad part of it is that her parents didn't know of her illness until they received a telegram of their daughter's death.

Fredericton, Nov. 5.—Alice Belyea, aged 20, died in the Victoria Hospital last night of pneumonia, following an influenza. This is the twenty-first death in the epidemic here. Miss Belyea had been a student nurse at the Victoria Hospital for a year. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Belyea, and is survived by her parents and two brothers, John and William, all of Fredericton.

Mrs. T. M. Burns, of Exmouth St., received word yesterday of the death of her brother, Laurence V. McGill, of Rochester, N.H., which occurred on Monday evening. He was a native of St. John and a son of the late Laurence and Mary McGill. He left here about thirty years ago and took up the practice of law in the States. At the time of his death he was a municipal judge in Rochester. Besides his wife, he is survived by one brother, Rev. H. J. McGill, of Sanford, Maine, and two sisters, Mrs. Thomas Lundrigan, of Bath, Me., and Mrs. T. M. Burns of this city.

The body of Harrison Spencer, chief engineer of the C. P. R. steamer Princess Victoria, passed through the city yesterday en route to the late home of deceased in Bay Roberts, Newfoundland, while working in British Columbia.

The death occurred in the Home for Incurables yesterday morning of Mary, widow of Daniel Lynch. She leaves four sons, Walter, Daniel, Harry and Edward, over 40 years of age. Her sisters, Mrs. Leighton, Mrs. Reed, Mrs. J. Henderson and Mrs. Affolte. The funeral will take place this afternoon.

Deceased was a blacksmith by trade and had a shop on Brussels street. About a week ago he contracted influenza which developed into pneumonia, and was conveyed to the hospital on Monday evening. Deceased has no relatives in this city, but has a married sister living in Halifax; his other remaining relatives reside in England, where he came from a few years ago. He was decidedly popular among the young men of the city, who will regret to hear of his demise so early in life. To the surviving relatives is extended the sympathy of all.

And Further Notice that any Employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part II. of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.


