George William Brown, who was of Loyalist descent.

was born at Southampton, N. B., on
September 18, 1812, so that he was in
his 89th year. He was the third son
of the late William Brown and the
fifth of six brothers to die. He began
his career as a farmer, though he never
lived, chiefly on account of no railway or
steamboat communication with Frederic-
ton. He was a man of considerable
means, and without a cent of capital, but
with indomitable pluck and energy, he en-
larged, and ditched, and cultivated and
fenced till he had one of the largest and best
farms in the county—yielding 100 tons
of hay and 1,000 bushels of oats. But, by
misadventure, he was a mechanic and builder.
He was a member of the Grand Lodge of
Fredericton, and in his later years he
travelling along these lines, he would have
stood easily chief among men of these par-
ticular callings in the province. As it
was he acquired sufficient knowledge to
enable him to build mills, churches, boats,
etc. He was at once a millwright, a
blacksmith, a carpenter, an engineer, and
a general handy man. In his later years
he was particularly noted for his knowl-
edge of the steam engine, and he was
one of the best of his kind in the county.
