The Sub-Committee of Charity have the honor to make the following Report:

Seventy-two cases of distress have been relieved during the past year, comprising 95 persons, 65 men, 14 women and 16 children.

The amount expended by the Sub-Committee is \$607.97, distributed as follows, viz:—
