Town Meetings.

Town meetings are becoming quite a common and important feature of the municipal government in Wolfville.

For the electors to come together thus and discuss the town affairs in an intelligent manner must necessarily do a great deal toward awakening among the citizens an interest in town matters, and giving them enlightened and intelligent views thereon.

It is very easy for the citizens of a town to get into a habit of fault-finding in the manner in which the town affairs are being conducted.

Every citizen of Athis, it is said, was able to rule the city, if occasion demanded, and the secret of this general intelligence lies largely in the method practiced of governing the city by means of the public assembly.

By submitting to the arbitrament of the ratepayers the more important civic matters, more security against reckless legislation is also guaranteed.

The great danger in these days particularly in town, is that the wheels of legislation should move too quickly, and that the consequences be too sudden and unexpected.

We hold, therefore, that the public meeting for the purpose of discussing civic matters is an excellent institution, and that it should be resorted to in the future, even more than in the past.

As a rule our public meetings are extremely interesting and profitable. The proportion of ratepayers who express themselves clearly and intelligently on public matters is much larger in Wolfville than in most places of its size.

A public meeting is essentially a meeting of the citizens as such. At such a gathering a councillor should take no higher rank than newspaper man or any other insignificant person.

Each speaker should confine himself exclusively to the matter before the meeting. He should not be inclined or allowed to bring into his remarks anything irrelevant to this discussion, or any personal references.

We understand that Dr. Percy Heales, through the local legislature, has been permitted, without examination, to have his name enrolled on the dental register.
