# Penalties rife in boxla final

Given Mississauga's Junior Lacrosse Association's financial position, no one would have been surprised if a hat had been passed out for a collection after Friday night's 15-15 tied game between Chiefs and St. Catharines.

Two Mississauga players took early showers on game misconducts and irate coach Morley Kells was saved from falling into the box in the second period when the referee handed him a game misconduct.

Chiefs had to come up with \$25 for each penalty to ensure that players and coach made it to the opening playoff game against Hamilton last night. Rob Gemmill, usually a low penalty performer and a high quality scorer for the Chiefs, blew his cool at the 15 minute mark and racked up more than 37 minutes in penalties before he received a

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so we can play on even terms and use our fast break system," Kells stresses.

# Carlos Alves--soccer pro at 12

When a Canadian boy is 12, the best he can hope for is to have the best collection of bubblegum picture cards of his favorite professional athletes. But at that tender age, Carlos Alves, the inside forward for Panhellenic in the first division of the National Soccer League was a professional in his native Brazil.

"When I was 12," says Alves, who is now 25, I played for the Infante de Brazil. I

used to get paid about \$5 a week. It doesn't sound like much now but at the time it seemed like a fortune."

For the past 13 years, Alves has travelled around the world playing the game he loves and this year, as well as volunteering his spare time to coach the Windsor-Mississauga Under 23's.

Until he was 20, Alves moved his way up through the professional soccer ranks in Brazil, but the realization that

stiff competition in Brazil might delay his dream of playing on a national team led Alves to accept an offer to play in Portugal.

"When the chance came to play for a national team came up, I took it and went off to play for the Belenenses de Portugal but the political situation in Portugal was such a mess that after one year, I thought I would be better off at home."

Before Alves returned to Brazil, however, an offer to

full time job to make ends meet.

Alves earns \$5,000 plus bonuses for the six month season with Panhellenic in addition to his earnings as a factory worker.

When asked why he coaches in addition to his playing duties and his job when he really doesn't have to, Alves replies candidly: "I know I don't have to do it but soccer has been my whole life and I would like to pass on some of the lessons I've learned."

When I started with these boys they didn't even know how to stop the ball or pass but now they are learning. This is our first year and we're in third place against teams which have been around for years. We don't have to be ashamed of anything."

Alves has found the transition to coaching very easy and he gives much of the credit to his players.

"I am only a year or two older than most of them, but they seem to respect me and listen to me and do what I tell them and I in turn respect them."

From all accounts, soccer is growing rapidly in Canada.

Even in Mississauga, the ranks of amateur soccer players have almost doubled in the past year.

Aldo Lista, the manager of the Under 23's says that now almost 3,000 boys are playing on 220 teams.

"Canada has everything it needs to be a big soccer country," says Alves, "but it's hard to compete against the

popularity of hockey. The climate doesn't help either. You need lots of time to train, practise and play—and that's hard to do in the snow."

In February, Alves married a Canadian girl in a civil ceremony and in the fall all his family is visiting from Brazil to take part in a full fledged church wedding.

Throughout his career, Alves has played with and against the best in the star studded world of international soccer and now he is beginning to pass on his talents and wisdom. The Mississauga soccer community is fortunate and happy that Alves has made that beginning here.

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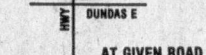
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
