Sandwiches for snack time

Now that school is out, the busy mother finds that whether they are at the cottage or just stay at home, sandwiches play an important role in keeping the youngsters happy and their appetites appeased.

If yours is the home where the neighbourhood youngsters like to congregate, it is well to have make-ahead sandwiches on hand. To make 10 sandwiches at one time does not take as long as to make the same number on 10 different occasions.

Most sandwich fillings can be used in all types of sandwiches but the texture of the filling and the amount used will depend on whether the sandwiches are to be hearty or dainty.

Make sure that the filling is sufficiently moist to prevent dryness in the sandwich, but not so moist that it will seep into the bread.

"Pep up" fillings that taste flat by adding salt and pepper, a few drops of lemon juice, vinegar, pepper sauce or Worcestershire sauce, chopped pickle, horseradish etc. — just a little at a time will do.

For mealtime, hot sandwiches with meat, fish or fowl with gravy and if you wish French fries, are filling.

Here you will find a few suggestions of tasty sandwich filling when the old peanut butter begins to wane.

- SWISS CHEESE SANDWICHES**
 4 cups butter or margarine
 1 cup Sauterne
 8 (1 inch) slices French or Vienna bread
 Dash ground black pepper
 8 (1 1/2 inch) slices Swiss cheese
 Dash paprika
 Melt butter in a large skillet or on a heated grill. Pour Sauterne in a shallow pie plate. Dip bread slices into Sauterne, turning them to saturate both sides. Place dipped bread in skillet or on grill; grill a little black pepper over bread slices, then top with a slice of Swiss cheese and sprinkle paprika over cheese. Cover skillet or grill and heat for 2 or 3 minutes, or until bread toasts on bottom and cheese becomes runny. Serve hot with a tossed salad or chowder.
 Yield: 4 servings of 2 slices each.
- CORNED BEEF-CHEESE SANDWICHES**
 4 green onions, sliced
 1/2 tsp. salt
 Dash pepper
 2 tsp. vinegar
 1 tsp. water
 2 tsp. soft butter or margarine
 12 slices enriched white bread
 8-12 thin slices corned beef
 4 (1 oz.) slices Canadian cheddar cheese
 Combine sliced onions, salt, pepper, vinegar and water; let stand about 15 minutes, then drain liquid off. To assemble sandwiches: Spread 1/2 teaspoon butter over bread slices.
 Place 2 to 3 sliced corned beef on 4 buttered bread slices, cover with another bread slice and top with a slice of cheese. Arrange drained onion slices over cheese and complete sandwiches with remaining bread slice.
 Yield: 4 Corned Beef-Cheese Sandwiches.
- HAM 'N EGG SANDWICHES**
 1/4 cup ham salad or deviled ham
 2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
 8 slices wheat bread
 Spread 3 tsp. ham salad over each of 4 bread slices; top each with 1/2 a sliced egg and another slice of bread.
 Yield: 4 Ham 'N Egg Sandwiches.
- LITTLE RED INDIAN SANDWICHES**
 1 cup drained, cooked or canned kidney beans
 1 tsp. slaw dressing
 2 tsp. chopped celery
 1 tsp. chopped onion
 1/4 tsp. dry mustard
 4 strips crisp, cooked bacon
 Mash or sieve beans, add slaw dressing, celery, onion and mustard. Spread 3 tsp. bean mixture over bottom half of each bun, top with a strip of bacon, cut in half, add a bun top.
 Yield: 4 Little Red Indian Sandwiches.
- CRANBERRY-CHEESE SANDWICHES**
 1/2 cup sharp cheddar cheese
 1/4 cup whole cranberry sauce
 4 sliced wiener buns
 Spread 1 tsp. cheddar spread over cut side of each bun half. Place matching bun halves together with 1 tsp. cranberry sauce in-between.
 Yield: 4 Cranberry-Cheese Sandwiches.
- BANANA-BACON SANDWICHES**
 8 slices enriched bread toast
 2 bananas, ripe
 8 thin slices tomato
 8 slices crisp bacon
 8 tsp. mayonnaise or salad dressing
 Slice bananas twice, lengthwise, and once through the centre. Place 3 pieces banana on each of four slices toast; top each with 2 slices tomato, 2 bacon slices and 2 tsp. mayonnaise. Cover with second slice of toast.
 Yield: 4 Banana-Bacon Sandwiches.
- KABOB SANDWICHES**
 For outdoors or for your patio table, the tastiest of the tastiest is always a toasted sandwich! There is a whole string of toasted sandwiches, cooked on a skewer on the coals to choose, if you are so inclined.
 To make each sandwich, butter 3 slices enriched bread; spread one slice with a deviled ham and another with smoke-flavoured cheese spread. Assemble into 3-deck sandwich, trim crusts and cut into 4 equal-sized squares. Thread the sandwiches onto a long skewer, alternating them with dill pickle slices and stuffed olives. Toast over hot coals, turning frequently so all sides will brown.
- CINNAMON MUFFINS**
 In the tradition of Canadian hospitality, a hostess serves hot breads to welcome guests. Today with so many varieties of bread it is easy to carry off this tradition on a moment's notice when your friends drop by for a chat. For 8 servings of Cinnamon Muffins, split 4 English muffins in half. Butter each half and sprinkle generously with
