"Wonder how he feels!" [Now the shouts increase] " The Queen! - Elizabeth! - Long live the Queen!" -[An unanimous uproar]"God save the Queen!"-] [Meanwhile, coming from the far corner, L., the QUEEN'S PROCESSION has entered, as follows: First a MARSHAL, bearing a white wand; then eight trumpeters, with long silver trumpets; PENSIONER, and FOOTMEN; GENTLEMEN-AT-ARMS; the QUEEN'S coach, drawn by two milkwhite steeds, led by grooms; beside the Coach, WILLIAM DEVEREUX, EARL OF ESSEX, leads the QUEEN'S horse of state; then LADIES of the Court, including ELIZABETH SYDENHAM; then the LORDS of the Council, including BURGHLEY, RALEIGH, and HATTON; then JUDGES. TLEMEN-AT-ARMS close the procession. The TRUMPETERS turn off and standing on the lowest step of St. Paul's blow a trumpet-march while the procession makes the circuit of the stage. The QUEEN'S coach, which is merely a platform on very low wheels inside the frame, has a canopy of cloth of gold supported by four gilt pillars. It is brought up at the right angle of Ludgate Hill. There the horses are unhooked and led off, R. Four Pensioners lift the pillars out of their sockets, and so carry off the canopy. Two FOOT-MEN let down the side of the coach which forms steps, and now the coach is a throne. The Cour-TIERS, etc. form two groups below and above the Meanwhile the LORD MAYOR and throne. SHERIFFS have advanced with the MACE-BEARER and SWORD-BEARER. The LORD MAYOR takes the sword and offers it to the QUEEN. She touches it and he hands it back to the SWORD-BEARER.
