MANUFACTURERS RETURN.

INCREASED BUSINESS EXPECTED FROM VISIT.

No Reply to the Question, "Will Canada Leave the Tariff as it is?"—U. S. Goods in the West.

Toronto, Oct. 13.—After nearly seven thousand miles of a journey across the continent and back, the members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, who left here on September 19 on their annual excursion, reached Toronto at 1.30 this morning. The Canadian Pacific train that carried them was the heaviest that ever went through to the coast, and through the Rocky Mountains three engines were required to pull it. Nine sleepers were brought into Toronto and most of the members remained on the train until morning.

A great deal of interest centred in the opinions of the manufacturers in regard to the recent speech delivered by Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain at Glasgow. Many of them, however, had not read the speech, not having received the newspapers regularly, while others who were spoken to did not desire at the present time to make any statement.

1. Are you in favor of reserving to the British manufacturers the Canadian market for the products of secondary industries not now existing in this country?

2. Are you in favor of leaving the tariff walls against Britain as at present?

To these questions, Geo. E. Drummond, President, speaking for the entire association, said:—"On general principles, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is heartily in sympathy with Mr. Chamberlain's propaganda for a policy of self-preservation in Great Britain and closer trade relations between the mother country and the colonies, on the basis of such mutual preferences as conditions within the several parts of the empire may be found to permit of. We favor the appointment of a commission, consisting of representatives from the mother country and the colonies, to fully investigate the whole question, as suggested in the resolution adopted at the recent conference of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire held in Montreal, which resolution was unanimously supported by the representatives of our association."

Mr. W. M. Birks of the firm of Henry Birks & Company, jewellers, of Montreal, in an interview, however, answered the two questions submitted. He stated that he would not like to limit the industrial future of Canada. "I am heartily in sympathy with Mr. Chamberlain's aims," said Mr. Birks, "but as to the industrial future here I would hesitate to state that I would put any limit to it. I would like to see the tariff wall raised against the United States, so as to force United States manufacturers, who desire Canadian business, to manufacture in this country. I would raise the tariff against the United States one-third higher, and then by giving a 50 per cent. preference to Great Britain we would be leaving the tariff walls as they are now. In our country we have a 30 per cent. duty, but the British preference makes it 25 per cent. against the mother country. I am more of a protectionist now than I was five years ago."

"I found in the west, too, that the Canadian spirit existed and was growing strong, and that while there were instances of opinion, the desire was not to be sectional, but to uphold the east and the west against all others, and to have such a policy as would uphold the entire Dominion."

As to the trip generally, Mr. Drummond, again speaking on behalf of the association, said: "He would indeed be a pessimist who could not be delighted with our tour, and most enthusiastic with regard to the great national results which are sure to follow. Leaving the east with 170 people, including many of the Dominion's most important business men, we have travelled nearly 7,000 miles, visited 28 different points, and have been throughout on Canadian soil. The west has been to us a great revelation. We have been thoroughly impressed with its magnificent extent, its beautiful variety of scenery, and its wonderful possibilities. Beyond everything else, we have been delighted with the splendid welcome which has been given us at every centre, and the broad Canadian sentiment which exists throughout the west. Too much cannot be said regarding the capability of our western country. We are amazed at the development which has taken place in farming, ranching, lumbering, mining and fisheries, and as yet we have but touched the fringe of our magnificent resources. As far as time would permit we have entered carefully into the consideration of every problem which confronts our western citizens. We are one with them for increased and increasing transportation facilities, which the rapid development of the country will demand; and just here we wish to express our admiration for the splendid national work accomplished by the C. P. Railway. Their service on land and water is unsurpassed."

MISS M. FERGUSON KILLED.

Shelburne Young Woman Meets Death on the Track at Georgetown.

Georgetown, Oct. 13.—Miss M. Ferguson, a young woman about 24 years of age, who was employed as servant for J. R. Lindsay, was struck and instantly killed Sunday by the eastbound express train at 6.30. The body was taken this morning to her late home at Shelburne for burial.

Industries For Fort Frances.

THE FISCAL FIGHT.

British Liberals Criticize Mr. Chamberlain.

London, Oct. 13.—Mr. Chamberlain is now resting at his residence in Birmingham and is not engaged to speak for another fortnight. He will utilize the interval to elaborate his scheme and prepare a reply to the objections raised by his opponents. Meanwhile the fiscal campaign is being vigorously pursued in the country. Speeches will be delivered daily by political leaders, particularly of the Liberal party. Mr. Chamberlain's reference to the condition of the tin-plate industry has been strongly criticized, the experts pointing out that though the trade with the United States has decreased, there is a great increase in the number of mills working in Great Britain, and the trade is flourishing.

Sir John Jenkins, formerly Liberal-Unionist member of Parliament for Carmarthen and Chairman of the Swansea Metal Exchange, speaking before the Swansea Harbor Trust said that the condition of the tin trade was unwarranted. The first nine months of the present year compared with two years ago showed an increase of 18,000 tons. No tin-plate bars had been imported since early in 1901, proving that Wales was able to compete satisfactorily with the world, and was able to supply bars at a rate which gave no encouragement to American dumping.

Sir Henry Fowler, Liberal, addressed an enthusiastic meeting in Glasgow. He declared the country was stronger financially than ever before. He ridiculed Mr. Chamberlain's contention of declining trade and said that the colonies needed no bribe to keep within the empire. Where one door was shut on a British industry another was opened. The country was well able to hold its own in the present commercial struggle.

Austen Chamberlain, the new Chancellor of the Exchequer, replying to a vote of congratulation at Acock's Green, Worcestershire, his Parliamentary constituency, said that he regretted that the new issues had lost the Government some valuable supporters, and declared himself in entire harmony with Mr. Balfour's programme as outlined at Sheffield. There was a great danger, he said, in complacently assuming that Great Britain's fiscal policy needed no revision. He declared that it was against all the canons of sound finance that the income tax, the nation's first reserve in time of war, should stand at eleven pence in time of peace. Mr. Chamberlain announced that the Government would not dissolve until the lessons of the South African War Commission report had been applied and the War Office reorganized.

The foregoing interesting announcement confirms the general impression that it is the Government's intention to meet Parliament and proceed with business, leaving the fiscal problem as far as any attempt at legislation is concerned.

Lord Stanley, the new Postmaster-General, in a speech at Bolton, declared himself in favor of Mr. Balfour's Sheffield programme, but opposed to Mr. Chamberlain's food-taxing project.

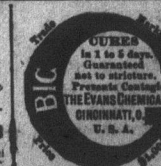
