At East Buffalo lambs are quoted at \$5 to \$7.  
 There is another drop in hog prices. At the city market on Thursday they were quoted at \$5 a cwt. for selects and \$5.75 for lights. Heavy Danish sittings and lower quotations on the British and American markets are the cause. The supply in Ontario is small and apparently has nothing to do with the lower quotations. At East Buffalo quotations were reported 10c to 15c a cwt. lower on Thursday, being as follows: heavy and mixed, \$5.50 to \$5.85; roughs, \$4.65 to \$4.90; pigs, \$4.50 to \$4.85; and dairies, \$5.50 to \$5.75 a cwt.

**UNION STOCK YARD PRICES**  
 West Toronto, May 18.—The run at the Union Stock Yards, West Toronto, to-day, was large, consisting of 89 cars, comprising 1,781 cattle, 19 steers, 58 hogs and 174 calves. There was a little easier feeling, due to large run, but prices are no lower than a week ago. The run of winter feed cattle will be over in a week or two. Export steers sold at \$4.75 to \$5.25, and export bulls at \$4 to \$5 a cwt. Butchers' cattle sold at \$5 to \$5.50 for the best and cows at \$4 to \$4.75 a cwt. Real fancy butchers' cattle would bring \$6 a cwt. No feeders and stockers offered. Calves sold at \$3 to \$4.75 a cwt. Two sold at \$4.50 to \$5.50. Bucks at \$4 to \$4.50, and yearlings at \$7 to \$7.50 a cwt. Spring lambs sold at \$1.50 to \$4.50 each. Hogs sold at \$5 or \$5.75 a cwt. f.o.b. at county points.

**PETERBORO FARMERS MARKET**  
 Peterborough, Ont., May 16, 1908.—The market was larger this morning than it has been for three or four weeks, the wet weather evidently having delayed more important operations on the farm. A large number of young pigs were offered for sale, also apples and potatoes. More poultry was offered than usual, particularly turkeys.

Shorthorns, 10233 pedigrees; Ayrshires, 2164 pedigrees; Herefords, 683 pedigrees; Swine, 5277 pedigrees; Clydesdales, 6317 pedigrees; Hackneys, 132 pedigrees; shires, 100 pedigrees; Thoroughbreds, 6 pedigrees; sheep, 1028 pedigrees; Galloways, 183 pedigrees; Polled Angus, 1,156 pedigrees; Jerseys, 356 pedigrees; Red Polled, 26 pedigrees; 2 Guernseys, 3 pedigrees; Canadian Cattle 576 pedigrees; Canadian Horses 474 pedigrees; an increase of about 6,000 pedigrees over what was recorded in 1906, which is a very substantial increase.

 Spring Brook Farm, Breslau, Ont., long noted for its fine herds of Holstein cattle and Tamworth hogs, was never in better shape to supply exacting customers than it is today. This bull's dam, Tantha Jewel Micheldale 1rd, won 1st in Guelph dairy show, 1906, and from official record being 17 lb butter in 7 days as a 2 year old. His dam, Tantha Jewel Micheldale gave 50 lb milk in 7 days, breeding 32 lb butter. This cow's stock produced at Spring Brook invariably score highest honors when shown at Toronto and the other large exhibitions.

The Tamworth herd is composed of the best of the registered boys, several of them being imported, from prize winning ancestors. The herd is headed by Knowle King David, imp sire Jockey, 956, who won 1st prize at the Ontario show at the leading exhibitions in Great Britain. This boar is well proportioned and of a fine make, and of good stock. The sow that was imported at the same time, Knowle Sultana, is also from a noted show family, her dam Knowle Beauty, 1907, was champion and also cup competing against all breeds at Birmingham in 1905. Anyone wanting to know more about this fine sow will take in securing one or more of this sow's first litter, that was in dam, or those she is now suckling. Mr. A. C.  The Hume Farm, Menie, Ont., is situated, as many of our readers know, in one of the best dairy districts of Ontario, in Northumberland and County. Ayrshire cattle bred on this farm have a reputation that is world wide. This herd is headed by two grand imported bulls. One, Lessensock Oysama's Heir, 2347, bred by A. Montgomerie, is a very promising chap. He headed the 2nd prize herd at the Canadian National, Toronto, Dominion Exhibition, Sherbrooke and Ottawa, as well as at the Ontario show. His sire also fell. His assistant, Lessensock Royal Monarch, imp, 2464, has also proved himself a remarkable good sire, producing stock as uniform as air. He combines with it, show yard qualities, having won 1st at the Dominion Exhibition, Halifax, and 1st at Ottawa show, and 2nd all round the circuit last year.

Among the grand lot of females in this herd were Eva, of Menie, the champion grand champion of 1905 and 1907, and Prides of Hume's Farm, unbeaten throughout the circuit last year. These are sufficient to prove Mr. Hume's ability as a breeder. As opportunity affords itself, Messrs. Hume & Co. are working their cows into the hands of the public. One that has recently qualified for that record, is Annie of Warkworth, giving 6,000 lbs. milk in 9 months from a 2 year old, the whole herd, including 23 year olds, are producing 20 to 54 lbs. of milk per day on grass.
