Petrograd, March 15—The Emperor of
Russia has abdicated, and Grand Duke
Michael Alexandrovitch, his younger
brother, has been named as regent. The
Russian ministry, charged with corruption
and incompetence, has been swept out of
office. One minister, Alexander Proto-
popoff, head of the interior department,
is reported to have been killed, and three
other ministers, as well as the president
of the Imperial Council, are under arrest.

A new national cabinet is announced,
with Prince Lvoff as president of the
council and premier, and the other offices
held by the men who are close to the Rus-
sian people. The members of the new
national cabinet are announced as follows:
Premier, president of the council and
minister of the interior—Prince Georges
E. Lvoff.

Milukoff.
