THE JUDICATURE BILL. The 12 Victoria, Cap. 28, Section XIX, contains the following provisions of legal skill on the part of the framers of the Judicature Act, now about to be declared in force:—

And it is enacted, That all Writs and Provisions to be issued out of the Superior Court, shall run in the name of Her Majesty, Her Heirs, or Successors, and shall be sealed with the Seal of the said Court, and signed by the Prothonotary for the District in which they shall issue, whose duty it shall be to make out and sign the same, and to seal and sign the same as aforesaid. Provided always, That the words "in witness whereof we have caused the Seal of our said Court to be hereunto affixed" shall be inserted in each writ. Provided also, That no writ or process shall be deemed void, or voidable, by reason of its having a wrong Seal, or no Seal thereon.

WHEN we find such blundering inconsistency, such gross negligence in the minor details of an Act, which in its operation must influence the relations of property, we may well inquire how long shall we be afflicted with a system which deprives the people of all control over the public servants!
