#### Day of Atonement Observed by Jews

The Day of Atonement, the most important of Jewish holy days, commenced last night at sunset, continu ing until to-night, and is being observed in Brantford, as throughoutout all countries where Jews are to be found, as a solemn day of fasting and prayer. The day, as its name implies, is for the purpose of atoning for sins of the past year by supplication and fasting, and it is the most rigidly observed of all days in the Hebrew cal-

Jews alike.

The rule in regard to fasting is very strict, and no Jew is permitted to taste food during the entire 24 hours, even the children, except the very young, being supposed to observe the fast. The services in the synagogues commence at 6 o'clock in the morning and continue all day until a blast from a ram's horn announces that the day is past. No work of any kind is permitted to be done on this special day.
