# City News Items

**ARBITRATION RESUMED.**  
The adjourned Arbitration between the L. J. Young N. Railway Company and J. Nightingale, the owner of the Brantford Ice Company property, was resumed at the County Court this morning. Judge Huycke, A. E. Watts, K.C., and J. McGee, formed the board of arbitration. M. K. Cowan, of Toronto, represented Nightingale, while W. S. Brewster, K.C., appeared on behalf of the L. E. and N. Evidence of the value of the property was taken this morning.

**ZION GUILD**  
The regular meeting of Zion Presbyterian Young People's Guild was held on Monday evening, when, after business matters had been disposed of, the educational committee took charge. The topic was French Authors. Three of whom were selected. Splendid papers were given by Mr. George Dowling on "Victor Hugo"; Mr. Charles Thompson on "Alexander Dumas"; and Mr. D. Macdonald on "Alphonse Daudet." Passages from his book "The Siege of Berlin" being read, and proving unusually interesting at the present time. There was a splendid attendance, and Mr. Macdonald's paper greatly to the pleasure of the meeting with a well rendered solo.

**The Story of German Defeat Is Explained**  
[By Special Wire to the Courier]  
PETROGRAD, Nov. 26.—Via London, 2:25 p.m.—Semi-official advices received from Poland, show that the German defeat at Lodz, culminating in the capture of a German army corps, was the result of a Russian manoeuvre by which the Germans were led in an unextricable trap.

The Russian left wing, resting on the River Warta and the Russian right wing on the Vistula, both lying along the Warsaw-Kalisz Railroad, moved forward in unison in the last two days. Simultaneously the Russian centre gave ground and the Germans followed, apparently relying on a German column from Wielun to renew the Russian left wing, and to form a juncture with the main German force.

In the meantime Russian reserves had come up and they surrounded the Germans, thousands of whom surrendered. Others fought their way north in an effort to join the German left in the vicinity of Lowicz, a town 44 miles southwest of Warsaw.

**St. Jerome Was Defeated**  
After a magnificent exhibition of basketball at the Collegiate gymnasium last night, the local boys defeated a contingent from St. Jerome College, Berlin, by the score of 20 to 15. It was a rousing game throughout and the Berlin boys were only overcome after a very determined struggle. So well did they play, that at the end of the first half they held the advantage, but after a great rally by the locals, in the second half the Teutons were dispossessed of their lead and they never recovered, being beaten by five points, after a glorious effort. The homeboys worked many fine combinations and repeatedly had the ball to the net before their opponents were aware of it. The Berlin boys took the game very seriously and were not a whit less pushful, as might be judged by the fact that they lead at one period. With dogged persistence, however, the locals stuck to their task and pulled through, making a wonderful recovery. Stubby Woods was the local star and he outshone all in his splendid tackling and rushing. The team consisted of: Buckborough, Wadlington, Smith, Colquhoun, and Wood. Harry Fleming acted as referee. A return game is to be arranged between the teams. The game was watched by a large gathering of ardent basketball followers, many of the fair sex being in evidence.

**A Vagrant is Under Fire**  
James Lynch, a vagrant, wandered into this city from Hamilton last night to undergo a vigorous cross-examination by Chief Slemin and Detective Chapman. He bore a great likeness to the man who one year ago broke his bonds at Toronto, and after laying a policeman out, succeeded in making his escape from captivity. Under cross-fire, Lynch was nothing to say. He came from out West, north of Winnipeg, and that was all that the police could get out of him. He might have been born on the prairie, he didn't know. He had forgotten where he lived out west, and could not tell the name of the dentist who filled his teeth. In various particulars he answered a description which the police possess of a man wanted in Toronto, and as he gave the chief no satisfaction, Lynch was remanded on a vagrancy charge for one week. Meanwhile the police are investigating the man's antecedents as he, to them, a very suspicious character.
