Vice President Mann of the C.N.R. was in the city on Monday on business. While here he took a run over the city. During the day he called on members of the local government.

Very little business was done at a meeting of the board of trade last Thursday evening. The committee on by-laws submitted their report and it will be considered at a meeting tomorrow evening.

Last Friday was Arbor Day, but very little out of the ordinary was done in the city. The banks and government offices were closed. Very few took much advantage of the day to plant trees. The stores were not closed.

The city council has received seven plans from local architects in the competition for plans for the proposed new hospital. The medical staff of the hospital has gone over the plans and pronounced them all good. The plans, however, will be narrowed down to three and from these one will be selected by a Chicago expert who will advise the council.

The House has been working overtime for the past couple of days and on Monday it was midnight before the speaker left the chair, and it was also quite late last night. The subject that has been under debate for the last three days has been the school book contract. The government has had its best speakers endorsing the wisdom of the contract, and showing its advantages while the opposition members have been showing how the contract was an extravagant and profligate one. There is likely to be another big discussion on the re-distribution bill when it comes up. Outside of these and the financial question it is not expected that there will be more big debates this session.

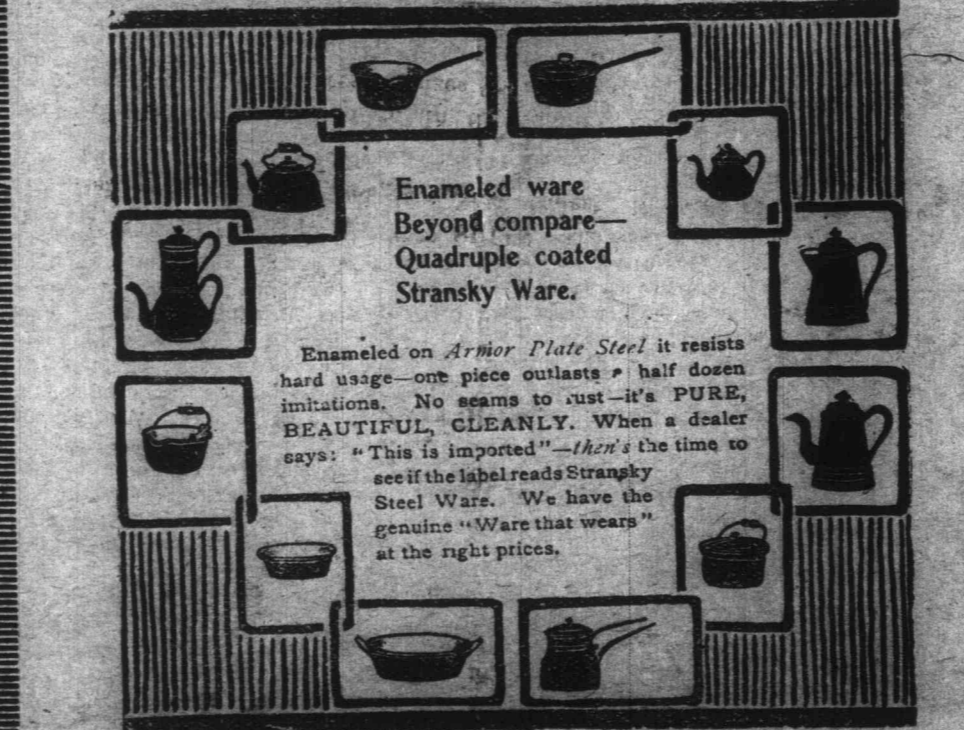

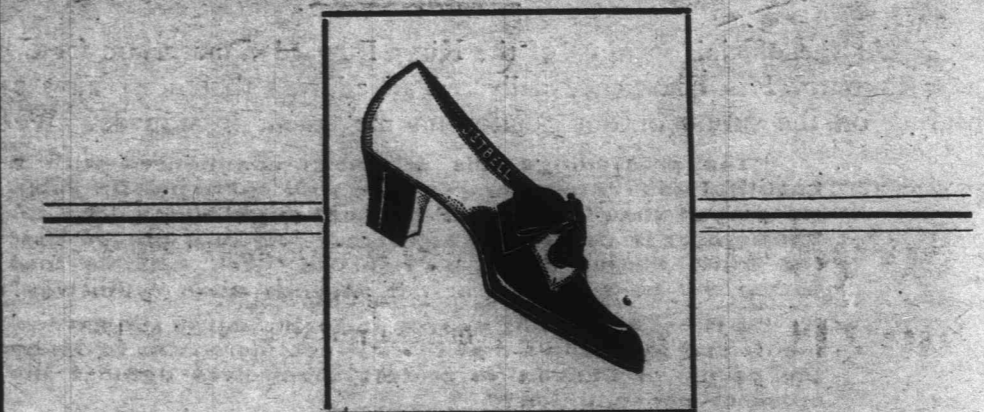
