

## IN FASHION'S REALM

VELVET AND VELVETEEN POPULAR FABRICS OF THE MOMENT.

Ways of Making These Frocks That Are Both Economical and Artistic. Evening Coats of Velveteen Trimmed With Fur and Lace.

Never has the fashion for velvet been more marked than at the present moment. We see it striped and plain, and there are some beautiful gowns made with checked and spotted patterns. Silk velvets are costly and beyond the reach of the multitude, but the substi-

tute, velveteen, is almost as beautiful in appearance and wears splendidly. Moreover, it can be worn with more courage because it is not so easily spoiled. Corduroy velveteen makes up beautifully for day wear. I have a weakness for a beautiful shade of green which I saw the other day making a most successful coat and skirt at an afternoon tea. The skirt was plain and full at the feet, not too long, though well on the ground. The coat was one of those jaunty little affairs coming below the waist and semitrimmed. It was trimmed with green silk braid and embroidered buttons and opened over a waistcoat of biscuit colored cloth embroidered in pink and blues.

For evening wear its uses are manifold, and it tells an equally pleasing story as cloak or gown. For home wear a velveteen gown is a real treasure. Made in some simple artistic style with a chemise and under-sleeves of lawn, it needs but a little embroidery as trimming.

A convertible gown, which needs but a moment's adjustment to serve for day and evening wear, has much to recommend it, and the woman of limited means welcomes it warmly. The illustration shows a capital design for this useful frock.

The bodice is simply made, with a slightly pouched effect in front. Round the neck comes a plain shaped piece of the material edged with piping. The sleeves have the new wide cuff, with a piping at the edge. The chemise and undersleeves may be in net or lace, or both, and a small piece of insertion is introduced to hide the join of the day and evening corsage. The little gumpie may be attached to a well fitting yoke of net with strings and loops to keep it well in place; then only a few tiny safety hooks and eyes, invisible under the insertion, will be necessary to hold it down. When a low dress is required the gown is worn without the gumpie. The insertion may be placed wherever it is most becoming, according to the figure of the wearer. The belt, being also of velveteen on the cross, fastened with some fancy buttons or cabochons, has a very graceful effect and helps

the plain full skirt to show the figure at its best. The skirt has no trimming whatever and need only be faced up with silk for a few inches above the hem. It can be worn over a silk petticoat to match.

The other illustration shows what a fascinating evening coat may be made from velveteen. The model is in a love ly shade of brown. It is cut with open side seams, held together by straps of gold braid with rosettes of gold tissue at each end. The deep collar and cuffs are edged with golden brown beaver fur, and the lining is of maize colored silk.

Dear Editor:—(1) How many members are there in the Dominion Parliament and Provincial Legislatures? (2) Are the members of the House of Lords in England elected or appointed? (3) Is there any book on the history of Canada and how much does it cost? (4) In what year were the negroes brought to the United States from Africa and by whom? (5) Are any people living in Franklin, Mackenzie, and other northern places? (6) What nationalities are living in the Yukon Territory, and is there any industry there?—Naturalized Canadian.

(1) In Dominion Parliament, 214; in Ontario Legislature, 92 members. (2) House of Lords consists of two archbishops and 24 bishops, and the temporal peers of England, Ireland and Scotland, who are by birth entitled to a seat. The total number is 594. (3) The High School History of Canada is perhaps most suitable; cost about \$1.25. A complete list of Canadian histories is obtainable at the Public Library. (4) In 1620 John Hawkins sold the first load of slaves to the English colonists at Jamestown, Virginia, and the traffic grew fast. (5) Esquimaux and white Indians in Mackenzie are to be found Indian fur hunters and fur traders. (6) In the Yukon are some Indians and a large population of various nationalities, all interested in the gold mining, which is the chief industry there.

## A Cheerful Spirit.

We may be thankful indeed that we here on Lake Superior have fared as well as we have during such a severe winter. The fall of snow has been exceptionally heavy, entailing expense in bush work, but we have the consolation to look forward to that there will be no danger in the spring of the winter's cut of timber being hung up in the bush or on the beds of the streams for want of water. This means much to the timber craft, and to the towns as well. It ensures the prompt fulfillment of contracts, the steady working of the sawmills, and money in the pockets of the contractors to begin the next season's work at an early date. Locally the heavy snowfall is a blessing in that it will give reservoir full of water, meaning the full working possibility of our electrical plants. Thus, though we may grumble and growl on the way from our homes to the offices, stores, and factories in the early morning, the cause for growling is not without its blessing.—Port Arthur Chronicle.

## Facts About Earthquakes.

R. F. Stupart, director of the observatory, delivered an address recently before the Canadian Institute on "The Seismic Disturbances of the Past Year." He described the scientific work and watchful attention going on in many parts of the world in connection with this terrible form of phenomenon, how inventive genius had directed its attention to the contrivance of that delicate instrument, the seismometer, by which an earth tremor so slight as to be absolutely imperceptible to any of the earth's denizens can be exactly measured in volume, duration and time. Seismological science had thus obtained from various points on the globe valuable information, from which important deductions and conclusions have been drawn, and to a large degree the same vibrations traced or identified in their waves of convulsion as they extend outward from their centre of disturbance. The data furnished by great seismic disturbances of the far past has each its peculiar characteristics, which, when comparatively applied to those of a more recent time, largely assisted in establishing seismic study on a systematic plane. Although it may never be reduced to an exact science, nor by any power of man a recurrence of those visitations of this earth's travail be prevented, yet science, which always brings with it increased knowledge, may, as has with meteorology, help the human family to prepare and guard against disaster.

## Will Against Will.

A certain prosy professor of physics is so great a misanthrope that he deliberately announces his lectures for the days when he has reason to think that his students will least want to attend. He commanded their presence on an election day once and drove them nearly wild by delivering a tedious essay on will power.

"If he wills it, a man may accomplish anything," he droned. "Let him make up his mind not to die, and he will live in spite of disease; let him decide that life is not worth living, and he will drop peacefully out of it. I challenge any student to cite an instance in which the power of the will has not triumphed over everything."

Up shot the reprobate of the class, a youth beloved by all his companions for his daring humor.

"Sir, I accept your challenge. You are wrong," he said.

"Pray mention an example," retorted the professor dryly.

Lot's Choice.—Gen. 13, 7-13. Read Gen. 13, 14-19. Golden Text—"Take heed and keep yourselves from all covetousness."—Luke 12, 15.

Here are two homesteaders, Abraham and his nephew Lot; one God-led, seeking a heavenly city; the other, self-led, seeking an earthly inheritance.

Abraham and Lot had been sojourning down in Egypt during a famine in Canaan. Abraham feared famine and fled to Egypt; there he feared the Egyptians would kill him that they might possess his wife, and he so deceived them that they were visited by a plague from God, that he and his wife might be delivered. All this came about from want of faith by the father of the faithful.

Verses 1-2—Abraham and Lot return north to Bethel and its sacred altar, when God's grace restored the backslider. "Return unto me and I will return unto thee, saith the Lord."

God had entrusted Abraham with great wealth, his flocks and herds and those of his nephew—see vs. 5-6-7—were so numerous that their cowboys fought for the cattle ranges, while no doubt the Canaanites and Perizzites would enjoy the strife, just as church quarrels are the laughing-stock of unbelievers to-day. Abraham is God's child, therefore a peacemaker, and although Lot's uncle and chief he calls him brother; gives him first choice, willing to take Lot's belongings. Every child of God can well afford to let a brother choose thus; better accept God's providences than try to make our own. Lot chose his portion in this world; so did Abraham; yet he gained and Lot lost. Why? Because he was looking after the so-called main chance, take care of number one meant self first. He did not say, Good-bye, uncle, I shall choose the rich bottom lands; you can dwell in Rocky

the land of the promise of Almighty God, but give us the almighty dollar, but he did try to serve God and mammon.

Every one of us is either a dweller in spirit and in heart in Canaan, Egypt, or Sodom. Canaan stands for fellowship with God, Egypt stands for the world and the flesh, and Sodom for a fire and brimstone doom.

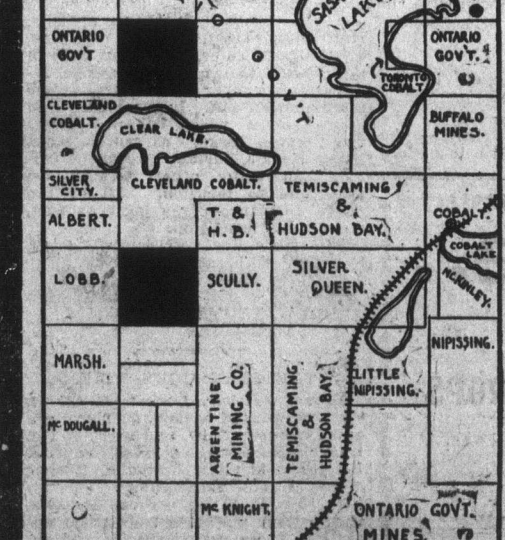
