
REYNOLDS IN FINE FETTLE.

INSANITY IN BRITAIN Commissioners' Report Shows

Alarming Increase. The annual report of the Lunacy Commissioners, recently published, shows a disquieting increase in the population of Great Britain'a asy-

population of Great Britain's asy-lums. At the beginning of this year one out of every 282 persons in England and Wales was reported to be insane. Ten years ago the ratio of insane per-sons was only one to 314. From 1869 to 1906 the population of England and Wales increased 55 1-2 per cent, while the insane increased 133 per cent. A significant fact brought to light by the report is the spread of senile dementia, which alone accounted for over 38 per cent. of last year's fresh lumacy cases. Discussing this phase of the situation, one medical author-ity expressed the belief that we live too long for the kind of work most of us do.

The advanced medical knowledge of to-day." said the authority referred to, "Reeps a multitude of persons alive whose minds are practically worn out. The present age demands more brain work and nerve strain from every one than was demanded only a few years ago. There is less and less demand for people who can only use their hands. The physical wear and tear has decreased, while the brain work and the strain on the hervous system have increased. "The result is that the mind dies first and the body is kept alive by medical science, which thus adds to the growing list of senile dementia cases in our asylums."

Deminions Should Shine in National Defence, Says Deakin.

Dominions Should Shine in National Defence, Says Deakin. Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 24.— (C. A. P.)—Discussing the preference proposals, Premier Deakin said the recent Imperial Conference made it is a present with the Mother Country. The present proposals, therefore, of-lared the gift of preference as a ten-tative one to be extended and adapt ed according to experience, so as to render it more effective. He strongly urged the gift of preference as a means of diverting trade from foreign to British goods, as a manifestation of attachment to the Mother Country. It was a misfortune that at the con-ference there had been not only ne-scheme for British tariff preference, but a proposal for Empire co-oper-tion had been availerly set aside. Only a coloriess substitute was offered. The preference was a potent prac-tical means of closer union and would come perhaps before long. All the Dominions had been most generously issated and the widest liberty conced-ed. They should respond with trade preferences and also undertake a share of the national defence and gradual-ly assue full responsibility. The Commonwealth House of Re-presentatives approval of the Got-ernment's preference proposals re-specting Britain, without division.


