REYNOLDS IN FINE FETTER.

Feels Confident of Completing His Walk to Time.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—Jimmy Reynolds, the 57-year-old "walking barber" of Port Hope, who left that town at 6 o'clock yesterday morning to tramp to the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, and then return, a distance of 125 miles, in 36 hours, completed one-half of his trip well within time at 10:10 last night.

Reynolds had the advantage of going with the wind on the return journey and he felt confident he would reach Port Hope well inside the time limit.

Norway was reached at 12:05 a. m. where another crowd of about 300 was encountered. Reynolds said he was in good shape and was willing to bet any money he could win out.

At 1:15 a. m. Reynolds was at the Halt-Way House and feeling fine.

STORM IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

Snow So Deep That Train Was Delayed Three Hours.

North Sydney, Oct. 23.—The worst snowstorm that has ever occurred in Newfoundland so early in the season took place during the past two days and as a result the train from St. John to Port Aux Basques was three hours late arriving at the latter place yesterday by the Bruce say that the storm was furious and much damage has been wrought to fishing and coasting vessels.

In Cordroy Valley snow was so deep and heavy along the railway that the engine was detached from the train and had to butt its way through the drift before it could proceed on its journey.

Bignist Goes For Trial.

Owen Sound, Oct. 23.—Thomas Richardson, bignist and thief, who was arrested in London on Saturday last, had a preliminary hearing yesterday before Police Magistrate Cresson, and was sent up for trial.

Richardson was cleverly caught by a fake advertisement inserted in Toronto papers for a band sawyer and filer to go to South America, to which he replied, using his Christian name. The writing was compared, with the result that he was easily captured.

Police Not Absolved.

Kingston, Oct. 23.—The license inspector, being charged with dereliction of duty, replies by a denial and an affirmation that he gets no help from the police.

This has brought the conduct of the police up for criticism for their indifference in so important a matter, and a local paper calls attention to the fact that the police are not relieved from the duty of enforcing the liquor law by the presence of a license inspector.

INSANITY IN BRITAIN.

Lunacy Commissioners' Report Shows Alarming Increase.

The annual report of the Lunacy Commissioners, recently published, shows a disquieting increase in the population of Great Britain's asylums.

At the beginning of this year one out of every 282 persons in England and Wales was reported to be insane. Ten years ago the ratio of insane persons was only one to 314. From 1869 to 1906 the population of England and Wales increased 55.2 per cent, while the insane increased 153 per cent.

A significant fact brought to light by the report is the spread of senile dementia, which alone accounted for over 38 per cent. of last year's fresh lunacy cases. Discussing this phase of the situation, one medical authority expressed the belief that we live too long for the kind of work most of us do.

"The advanced medical knowledge of to-day," said the authority referred to, "keeps a multitude of persons alive whose minds are practically worn out. The present age demands more brain work and nerve strain from every one than was demanded only a few years ago. There is less and less demand for people who can only use their hands. The physical wear and tear has decreased, while the brain work and the strain on the nervous system have increased."

"The result is that the mind dies first and the body is kept alive by medical science, which thus adds to the growing list of senile dementia cases in our asylums."

CLERKS TOOK THE ADVICE.

"Do It Now" Cards Worked Wonders in English Office.

A London dry goods merchant returned from a visit to the United States a short time ago with notions about procrastination being the thief of time remarkably developed. He brought with him a number of cards bearing the excellent printed maxim, "Do it now," and hung these up in his office and about his store.

Within a fortnight of the advent of the cards the chief cashier departed with the sum of £2,000, three clerks and deputations from two departments waited on the proprietor with requests for increased salaries, and his best lady typewriter slooped with a very businesslike and good-looking shop walker.

The cards have been removed.

India in Figures.

A wealth of interesting information concerning India is contained in a statistical abstract just issued by the India Office.

Here are a few figures which show the enormous size of the great dependency of Great Britain:

Area in square miles 1,773,103
Towns 2,143
Villages 723,005
Occupied houses 55,841,315
Population 294,361,056

Perhaps the most astonishing fact to be gathered from the bluebook is that a British-born population of under 100,000 maintains a peaceful control over more than a million square miles of British territory and rules over 230,000,000 of the native population. The native states and agencies cover an area of another 675,000 square miles and contain just over 55,000,000 persons. The languages spoken number 156.

Of the total population no fewer than 207,147,026 are Hindus, the home-dias number 62,400,000, Christians number 2,923,241, and among other religions are Sikh, Jain, Buddhist, Parsee, Jewish, and Animistic. Those of the Christian religion are split up into fourteen denominations, these including Anglican (453,462), Armenian, Baptist, Congregational, Greek, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Quaker, Roman Catholic, Roman-Syrian (Jacobite and others), and Salvationist.

Plague and wild animals are the two deadliest foes of the native Indian. In the last ten years as many as 4,600,000 persons have died of plague, while 251,000 have been killed by wild animals and snakes in British India alone.

Asked to Resign.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—Rev. Dr. G. O. Workman has been asked to resign the chair of Old Testament Exegesis at the Wesleyan Theological College.

The decision was reached by the college board about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, after a six-hour session.

The action of the board is based on allegations of doctrinal unsoundness in regard to Holy Scriptures, deity of Christ, sin, miracle and atonement. It is claimed by the board that Dr. Workman's views on the doctrines mentioned are in general Unitarian.

Dr. Workman was formerly a member of Victoria University faculty.

YOUNG LADY SAVES EXPRESS.

Gives Warning of Obstruction Placed on Track by Wreckers.

St. Catharines, Oct. 23.—At 9:30 o'clock Sunday night a young woman rushed into the tower house on the west side of the canal at the Michigan Central Railway bridge, at Welland, and breathlessly told the men on duty that iron was piled on the westbound track that would wreck the train.

Fast express No. 3 was due. The depot was hurriedly called over the phone, as the express was heard approaching, and the semaphore lights flashed against it just in the nick of time.

James Turner of Niagara Falls, yardmaster, and Gerrit Hill, clerk in depot, mounted a handcar and started for the spot, which came so near being the scene of a great railway wreck. They found two rail spreaders and a fish plate placed on the inside rail in a manner that would almost assuredly have hurled the express into the deep ditch alongside the track with frightful results.

The obstruction was removed and the express proceeded on its journey. Miss Sweney, a school teacher, residing three miles west of Welland, who gave the alarm, was walking to town when she discovered the iron piled on the tracks, and she says she removed seven pieces of iron as heavy as she could lift, before hastening to town to warn the railway men.

Officials at the M. C. R. will give out no information and attempt to discredit the story that trainwreckers were at such fiendish business, but nevertheless a force of detectives are in Welland working on the matter, and railway men declare that the manner in which the obstruction was placed on the rails prove conclusively that it was the work of experts.

An Arrest at Welland.

Welland, Oct. 23.—Edward Palmer, an English boy, aged 15 years, is in the county jail, arrested by Detective Monahan for placing a pile of rail plates and iron creepers on the M.C.R. tracks a mile west of here. A Chicago train narrowly missed destruction Sunday night. The boy says he did not know his work would do any harm.

APPROVE OF PREFERENCE.

Dominiens Should Shine in National Defence, Says Deakin.

Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 24.—(C. A. P.)—Discussing the preference proposals, Premier Deakin said the recent Imperial Conference made it clear that no reciprocity was possible at present with the Mother Country. The present proposals, therefore, offered the gift of preference as a tentative one to be extended and adapted according to experience, so as to render it more effective. He strongly urged the gift of preference as a means of diverting trade from foreign to British goods, as a manifestation of attachment to the Mother Country. It was a misfortune that at the conference there had been not only no scheme for British tariff preference, but a proposal for Empire co-operation had been cavalierly set aside. Only a colorless substitute was offered. The preference was a potent practical means of closer union and would come perhaps before long. All the Dominions had been most generously treated and the widest liberty conceded. They should respond with trade preferences and also undertake a share of the national defence and gradually assume full responsibility.

The Commonwealth House of Representatives approved of the Government's preference proposals respecting Britain, without division.

The Fate of Niagara.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 24.—The question whether the water flow of Niagara shall be utilized for commercial purposes or left for sightseers, will come up for settlement at the convention of the American Civic Association, which will be held simultaneously with that of the National Municipal League at Brown University, during the week of Nov. 19. Agents of the corporations who desire power privileges will appear to present their plans.

Gen. Francis V. Greene of New York will head a party of speakers who favor the utilization of the falls, while J. Horace McFarland of Harrisburg, Pa., will advocate that the natural beauty of the waterfall be left unimpaired. A third side of the discussion will be headed by John W. Langmuir of Toronto, president of the Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park, which has charge of the Canadian side, and President Charles Dow of the New York State Commission, which has jurisdiction over the American side.

Students Wreck Street Car.

Hamilton, Oct. 24.—The students of the School of Practical Science, Toronto, came to Hamilton yesterday morning on an educational trip. There were about 300 of them, and they visited the Westinghouse works and other large factories.

The students distinguished themselves by practically wrecking one of the street cars, seeming to find keen delight in tearing down the advertisements, breaking the bell-ropes, and in other ways making what is commonly known as "rough house."

It was the intention of the street railway company to invite the students to the various sub-stations of their Cataract Power Co., but Traction Manager Green announced that the invitation had been withdrawn because of the students' action in damaging the car.

Saving Her Mother's Heirlooms.

Brussels, Oct. 24.—At the request of Princess Louise, who was divorced last year by Prince Philip of Saxe-Cobourg and Gotha, the authorities here have postponed for a month the sale at auction of the jewels of the late Queen Henriette of Belgium for the benefit of the creditors of the princess. She declares that she will, at the expiration of thirty days, have sufficient funds to save her mother's heirlooms.
