season.

FINE CATTLE.—Mr. Josiah Wood
has a herd of about thirty Short-horns,
six of which he exhibited at the Show
yesterday. Five of these took first
prizes and the other second prize.
Among them was the celebrated bull,
Baron Fawley 9th, which took first
prize in his class at the Truro ex-
hibition and the sweepstakes prize for
the best bull of any class; and also
the famous cow Bessie Belle, 2nd,
which has taken first prize whenever
exhibited, including the Dominion ex-
hibition at St. John. Mr. Wood
claims that she is the best Durham
cow in the Maritime Provinces. Baron
Fawley 9th is a splendid animal.
He was calved on the 29th of Janu-
ary, 1885, and now weighs 2030 lbs.
His sire was Duke of Oxford, 88th,
and his dam was Lady Fawley 6th,
both being imported animals.

HOLSTEIN-FRIESIAN'S RECENT VICTORIES.—At the great Interna-
tional Fair, held this fall, at Buffalo,
N. Y., the Holstein-Friesian cow,
Bessie Fletcher, took the first prize
of making the most butter, if a
Holstein-Friesian. Netherlands
Peters, also a H. F., took second
prize. Both of the above are owned
by Smiths, Powell & Lamb, of
Sydney, N. Y. The above was for
the cow of any breed making the
most butter on the grass for three
days. At the Iowa State Fair, the
Holstein-Friesian stood first and third,
the milk being analyzed under the
Prof. Sber. System. These, together
with the recent test of Shadeland
Boon of 125½ lbs. of butter in 31
days, requiring during the test from
11 to 15 lbs. of milk to make one
pound of butter, undoubtedly puts
the Holstein-Friesian at the head of
the world as a dairy cow.

The S. & W. Exhibition.

It has come to be regarded as a
matter of course that there will be
rain on the day of the Fall Show of
the S. & W. Agricultural Society, and
yesterday did not prove an exception.
The unfavorable weather did not,
however, prevent a large attendance
of visitors, and the exhibition was
fairly successful. The number of ex-
hibits was 600 or about 150 less than
usual, the falling off being accounted
for to a large extent by the fact that
many of the farmers have been busy
during the last few days securing their
crops. The show of horses was de-
cidedly the best ever seen on the
grounds, and included among the
fine animals the recent purchases of
Messrs. T. Milburn & Co. of Dorchester,
and the pair of Percherons
bought at the Provincial stock
sale by Mr. Charles Fawcett. One of
the most attractive features of the
Show was the exhibit of carriage
horses driven by ladies, of which there
were seven entries, the winners being
Mr. A. W. Dixon's mare "Kittie",
driven by Mrs. Alfred Dixon, and
Mr. Charles Fawcett's mare "Minnie",
driven by Mrs. Ryan. The exhibit
of thoroughbred cattle was also large

train was unloading near Loss Creek,
on the Potomac branch, when the fast
Pennsylvania freight came along and
dashed into the construction cars. Of 40
Hungarians at work unloading ties, six
were killed outright and 26 injured. The
brakeman on the freight train was instan-
tly killed. Twenty freight cars were wrecked.
Three hours passed before help could
be procured and during that time the in-
jured lost so much blood that it is feared
many of them will die.

cate Harbor. Defence, no consideration,
and that it was an accommodation note.
Judgment reserved.—Jennison, of New
Glasgow, and C. K. Smith for plaintiff;
Townshend, Dickey & Rogers for de-
fendant.

—L. McDonald and Edmund Pugsley vs.
Collingwood Pugsley—This was a very in-
teresting case, which arose out of the
scales at River Hebert. Some seventeen
years ago, E. Pugsley allowed the de-
fendant to put the scales at the corner on
his land; recently he sold this land to his
co-plaintiff, McDonald, who wants to build
a house on it, and for that reason does
not want the land. The "squire" did not in-
tend to do so easy, hence this suit. How-
ever, on the day of trial, it was withdrawn,
each party paying their own costs, and
