Chatham Boy is Champion of Broncho Buster

Leo F. Moran, now of Boston, Confident of Winning in Texas Tournament in Fall

The hero of the following sketch, which we find in a Boston paper, was born in Chatham, the son of Michael Moran and nephew of Thomas Moran of Douglas avenue. He let here with a band of Gypsies when he was a boy, being unable to resist the lure of the horse, and appears to have lived with and on horses ever since.

When 'Whoopie! Yaho!' and everything else they yell on the plains of the west. For Boston has a real broncho buster, and if the stories they tell about him are true, he is a champion highkicker on any kind of a dad blasted horse, be he from New Mexico, Texas, or Maine.

Boston ought to have the shivers, else swell with pride, to know, that within its classic borders, which hold so much of the world's wonder, there has corralled the only dyed-in-the-wool champion broncho buster of the country.

His name is Leo F. Moran, and he lives in East Boston. He is going to prove his mettle by taking in the world broncho-busting contest in Dallas, Texas, in the fall. He is confident of winning the \$2,000 prize and coming home to Noddle Island with the championship belt, or sombrero, in his hand.

He will be pitted against Buck Peters of Bliss, Ok., the present title holder.

Served Three Years in France

Moran during the Word War was a member of the Canadian army—for he is a native born Canadian—and served three years in France at active fighting. He is only twenty-four years old now, and after two years of the battlefields of France he serves he fears no four-footed animal that walks, or bucks the plains.

He has been for much of his life a wild west rider with various circuses, but shook the tented arena to get a good rest in Boston before mounting the cussedness of the most ornery beast in the shape of a horse that Texas can produce.

The bucking contest in which he will take part is to be held at Helene, Texas, at the yearly round-up and he is taking a vacation, not even to him at a horse, for a time, before going to the Lone Star State.

Moran is the champion broncho buster of Mexico; won it last year against Buck Peters, the same broncho bucking rider who is to contest against him in Texas.

Moran is very modest and hates to talk about himself, which is different from most circus employees, but he says that he left home at an early age and has stuck to the circus game ever since, riding all sorts of wild horses and showing his skill at horsemanship and with lasso in many countries.

He is going to England to ride this fall in exhibitions, after he annexes the championship in Texas, which he is sure he will do.

He has stayed longest on a bucking horse of anyone on record, which is four minutes, three seconds and a half. He also took the championship of western Canada as a bull fighter.

He is not married and his only love is a horse. He generally rides in the winter in what is called a "ding Roman" act in indoor theatres and shows.

He is an accomplished roper and has spun three lances at one time, one in each hand and one with his teeth.

"I learned roping," he says, from an Indian at Edmonton, Alberta, and he was the best teacher in the world. At sixteen I was a jockey in Canada and have won two medals for hurdle jumping in England.

"I can do anything with a horse. It is all knowing how to handle them and I guess it comes natural with me. Success with animals is not learned. It is born in you."

"The greatest rider doesn't have the shape of a horse and that figure the animal. Look at my legs. Why I have ridden so much they look boy-legged. I can ride better than I can walk. My knees are stiff when I walk. I have ridden so much. Yes, I have met the best of them in the world, both at roping and riding and I guess I am as good as the best. You, I like Boston and I shall make it my home always. I like to go away, but all always glad to get back."

"I practice roping every night. Throw a thirty-foot rope and have roped some running horses at once. I wish they would have roping contests here, but the horses of the East are too tame. I have to use for a kind, gentle horse. The ones they back the better I like it and the more I feel at home. There is a hard life, but you must be used and excitement is what keeps all of us up to the game."

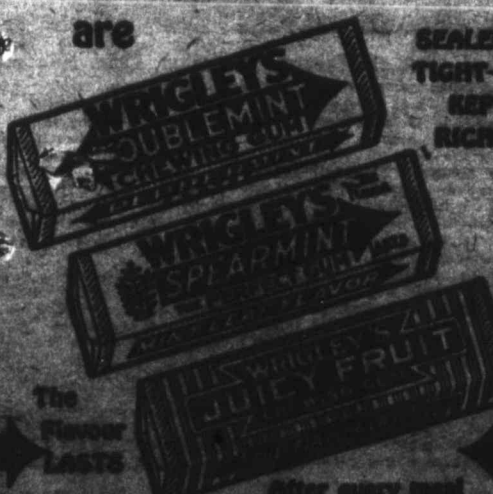
