Our Catholic colleges, it is to be observed, have always laid the greatest possible stress upon the classics, and have never paid the slightest attention to the criticisms of those modern wise folk who affected to look upon this branch of study as useless. The consequence is that the Catholic institu tions turn out regularly some excellent classical scholars, who find their accomplishments of genuine and practical value. 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
