### Hamilton and the Fenians.

Hamilton, March 13.—A meeting of the leading citizens was held this afternoon, at which the Mayor presided, to take into consideration the propriety of organizing a Home Guard for defence, in the event of the troops and volunteers being called to the front. A telegram from the Mayor to Col. Macdougall, was read, asking if the Government would furnish arms for 500 or 1,000 men in the event of the Home Guard being organized, and a reply to the effect that the wish of the Mayor had already been anticipated.

### American Troops Sent To The Front.

The Hamilton Times of last evening has the following despatch from Buffalo: "The following companies of the 18th U. S. regulars arrived this morning, and have gone into barracks at Fort Porter. One battalion of the 4th regular is on the way from Baltimore. A regiment of U. S. colored troops has arrived at Erie. It is believed that a general movement of troops to all points of the frontier is progressing. The Fenian element here is somewhat dependent in consequence."
