LLOYD GEORGE TO THE EDITORS.

LONDON, To-day.

The Governments of the British Dominions will have a voice in determining the terms of peace, according to Mr. Lloyd George. The Premier made this announcement in a speech at dinner in honor of the Canadian editors visiting England, at which Lord Beaverbrook was the host. This is a war in which we engaged the Empire, said the Premier, when we had to policy, and it is perfectly true that the policy, which we adopted to pro-tect smaller nations in Europe, was a policy which we embarked upon without any consultations with the Dominions. But you approved of it, hence you have the right 10 be consulted as to the policy beforehand and this is the change which has been effected as a result of the war. The contributions which you've made to enforce the treaties have given you the undeniable right to a voice in fashioning the policy which may con-nect you, and for that reason an imperial War Cabinet is a reality. The British are throwing their all into the furnace of war, their hearts, like ours, eager-ly and definitely desire victory in or-der to attain their ends. These sporting people have all applied themselves to mechanical problems and have suc-ceeded in producing tanks, which, in conjunction with the progress of avia-tion, are perhaps the principal fac-tors in delaying the Germans.
